MOSCOW (AP)—The satisfy the evergrowing thirst of the Russian population the soviet government in 1924 will produce 75,000,000 gallons of vodka of 40 per cent strength. The government also will produce 5,000,000 gallons of brandy and liquors of 60 per cent strength. The total cost of the production of vodka for the coming year is estimated at \$250,000,000 from which the state will derive a revenue of approximately \$175,000,000.

Raymond Griffith Is Rollicking Spy in Spirited Comedy

Swain turns back toward home but his niece refuses to leave Griffith, who agrees with the uncle that he cannot marry both and cannot decide which one to give up.

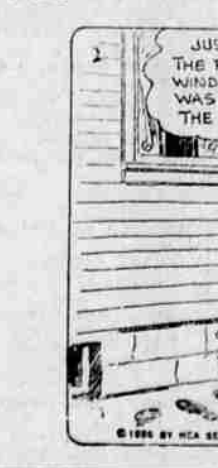
