MAJOR HURON WRITES HOME
 The best of military instruction is being received by Major H. H. Huron, Eastern Oregon commander of the O. N. G. and La Grande postmaster, according to a letter written by him from Fort Denning, Georgia, where he is taking a course, now more than half completed.
 "I have found the work very interesting and instructive and, at times, really entertaining," he says. "We are 12 national guard field officers and are received in a row of regulars. Regular students are of all grades from private to lieutenant. They call our (N. G.) work a refresher course."
 "We have lectures and practical work but a large part of the course is demonstrations of putting into effect provisions of existing regulations both in combat theories and organization of units. We are able to see, in the actual detail of men and equipment, just what we will be expected by command to see organizations, if called. We see the actual working of theories of combat and organization. For example, regulations state that a detail of ten men should erect 25 yards of barbed wire fence in 20 minutes. We saw a picked crew of nine from the 7th Infantry do it in eight. Then they threw a wire bridge across it and were over it in seconds."
 "Improved weapons are very interesting. The difference in speed in the range—in some cases two to three times the old."
 "The instructors are no doubt the pick of the service and are exceptionally good."
 "So my return I will pay a short visit to my father in Indiana. I expect to reach La Grande shortly after Feb. 20."
