MAKING EDUCATION EASY.

The days of the birch-rod system of punishment for whispering seem to have passed away. The old theory that a child could exercise his brain by struggling through the intricacies of Latin and Greek grammar, thereby making his mind more useful in practical ways, is being supplanted by a pleasanter one. The new idea disclaims any virtue in sitting in a stiff seat without communication; it also disclaims the value of doing hard tasks that will not in themselves be useful.

The results of such changes have yet to be demonstrated, for the value of training is not apparent until an individual's life has been spent and his contribution to human welfare made. The fact remains, however, that in education lies the hope of a country's future. Experiments, when they are made, must be carried on with a deep sense of the vital material with which they deal and the far-reaching effects which they may be the means of bringing about.

FOLLY OF CENSORSHIP.

So fearful are the Switzerland authorities of the power of suggestion they have obliterated with paint the deadly weapons pictured on posters advertising a Wild West movie thriller. The actuating thought is that if the cowboy munitions were left exposed to public view it would fill all the Swiss with an irresistible desire to use the whole arsenal upon each other with probable disastrous results. Unless the Swiss lack that human quality, curiosity, the picture theater showing the Wild West film was probably filled to capacity with persons curious to know what manner of thing this was which the public guardians had seen fit to conceal from the people.

At any rate, this act of Swiss censorship was no more effective than the spasmodic attempts of the post office department to suppress "naughty" magazines by excluding them from the mails. Exclusion from the mails makes business for the railroads and express companies and boosts sales of the censored periodical. Censorship makes business for the censored.

Before the United States emerged from the repressive influence of blue laws and puritanical morals purists among the provincial police sought to protect the public morals from corruption by pasting white paper over the munitionable parts of the anatomies of the scantily costumed ladies on burlesque and circus billboards. How grateful the theater and circus managers must have been for this co-operation from the constituted authorities!

Attempted censorship on Broadway made several New York theatrical producers both famous and wealthy in the season of 1924-25, and wherever censorship of literature has been essayed the black-listed books have immediately found a large market.

Pandora's box and Bluebeard's chamber were both opened by ladies who were more curious than obedient. Censorship is useful and desirable but care must be exercised how it is employed.
