WEEKLY GRAIN EXPORTS.
WASHINGTON (AP).—Grain exports last week from the United States were 2,335,000 bushels against 1,697,000 bushels the previous week.

Commodity department figures Monday gave the following comparison between last week's exports and those of the week before:
Wheat, 815,000 bushels against 781,000; rye, 90,000 bushels against none; oats, 148,000 against 82,000; corn, 996,000 against 749,000; barley, 377,000 against 84,000.

Canadian grains exported last week from the United States ports were 2,202,000 bushels against 3,260,000 bushels the previous week and North American exports of wheat flour last week were 197,000 barrels as compared with 144,000 barrels the week before.

VISIBLE GRAIN SUPPLY.
NEW YORK (AP).—The visible supply of American grain shows the following changes in bushels:
Wheat decreased \$44,000.
Corn increased 1,661,000.
Oats decreased 564,000.
Rye increased 90,000.

organization which will co-operate with existing agencies in community welfare activities. Work among the boys, he said, is particularly stressed by Rotarians throughout the world.

Community Uplift Club.
It is not a secret organization of any kind, but a purely business and professional men's club devoted to the best efforts of the community. Dr. McNary declared. And he encouraged upon the members of the La Grande club the fact that Rotarians got out of the organization in proportion to what they gave.

Rotary is an international organization. It originated in America and now has clubs in 42 countries, with some 50,000 members enrolled.

Activities Outlined.
The activities of Rotarians were outlined by Mr. Brown, who showed how the organization became an aid to other agencies and helped promote worthwhile projects in the community where it functioned.

After the organization had been perfected, Mr. Thompson gave some details in reference to membership. The number, he said, is restricted as to character. Membership, but after the club has been instituted, it may add members in a limited amount until the end of the first year, after which no limit is imposed.

Plan Great Expansion For Air Mail Service

under operation by the government are between:
New York and San Francisco via Baltimore, Cleveland, Bryan, Chicago, Iowa City, Des Moines, Omaha, North Platte, Cheyenne, Rawlins, Rock Springs, Salt Lake City, Elko, Reno and Sacramento; transcontinental service, 1,945,450 miles yearly.

New York and Chicago, via Baltimore, Cleveland and Bryan, over-night service, 358,644 miles yearly.

Several Rates of Postage.
Owing to the different laws establishing the various air mail services there are several rates of postage. On the transcontinental route the rate of 8 cents an ounce for each of the three zones, the zones ending at Chicago and Cheyenne. On the over-night service between New York and Chicago the rate is 10 cents an ounce. On each contract route, the rate is fixed at 10 cents an ounce for 1,000 miles or less; 15 cents for 1,000 to 1,500 miles and 20 cents for over 1,500 miles.

Air mail originating on contract routes and destined for points along the transcontinental route will be carried over the latter route at 5 cents an ounce for each zone in addition to the contract air mail postage.

as successful as had been anticipated. Speculation, no controlled prices, poor business methods, unwieldy payments, and the like were classed as some of the unfortunate things that had evolved to hurt some projects.

The government is gradually working away from all guess work in reclamation projects, however, he pointed out, and is heading toward a solution of the problem.

He declared that soil is the nation's greatest natural resource and that it must yield more food in the future to take care of America's growing population. Irrigation can add about one per cent to the productive area at present and drainage can add a little more, he said. The average yield on irrigated land is 28 per cent above non-irrigated land and 20 per cent higher prices can be commanded. This is a 48 per cent argument for irrigation, he said, and pointed out that a correct scheme of payments would prevent the project from being burdensome to settlers.

James F. Jardine, director of experiment stations for the state of Oregon, concurred with Mr. Powers in a short speech.

Test Plot Planned.

Dr. W. T. Fyfe, chairman of the agriculture committee, and J. P. Lottidge, of the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company, which will furnish free power for the test plot to be selected in the Grande Ronde valley in the near future, both spoke briefly.

A. R. Hunter, taxmaster, and chairman of the irrigation committee, declared that the Oregon Agricultural college would install an irrigation test plot in the valley with Robert Withcombe in charge. Definite selection will take place in the near future.

G. S. Birnie Speaks.
Prior to Mr. Powers' address, G. S. Birnie spoke briefly concerning the coming convention of northwest realtors here, and told some interesting facts about the chamber of commerce quarter's junket to two previous conventions. He urged all organizations and individuals to do everything possible to make the convention, which will be in July, a success. "It will really be an investment for La Grande and Eastern Oregon," he said. "We should be willing to give the visiting realtors all the talent and time we can muster to help make this the most successful convention in the organization's history." William Miller supplemented his remarks with a few well spoken words, winding up with a motion that asked the chamber of commerce to renew its support. The motion carried unanimously.

G. L. Dutton, O. N. G. captain, called attention to a drill exhibition and dance to be given at Zuber hall next Monday by Company E.
