Phillips creek, or Dry Run, as it is better known—flows through the Heyduck place, and has been used by him and by his predecessors on the property for purposes of household and farming for many years. It is declared.

Some time ago, Keene constructed a dam across the stream, denying the Heyduck right to its waters, and claiming that adjudication was had in 1918, and that neither Heyduck nor any of his predecessors having appeared at the hearing, they forfeited their privileges.

## MILK MOVE IN SCHOOLS ENDORSED

schoolroom. It is the right of every child to be physically fit. Every effort that is for his betterment is worthy of the united support of the entire community," Mrs. L. Mann declared.

"The school authorities appreciate the interest of the Central Parent-Teacher association in the welfare of the school children," J. T. Longfellow, superintendent, said this morning. "We are glad to have this interest translated into an activity of such practical value as milk distribution. I am sure that the added efficiency resultant from serving the milk at the recess period will be sufficient to compensate for the time required for the service."

Dr. Margaret Ingle has endorsed the project, because, in her opinion, "milk is of unquestioned value in the care and feeding of both normal and undernourished children."

## "A Constructive Effort."

"This is a real constructive effort in my opinion," asserted H. E. Coolidge, as he was told of the plan, "and I believe that the results cannot be beneficial to all school children, and particularly to those who most need this nourishment during the school hours."

"The cost of the milk to each individual student is so small, that it seems to me that most all parents could afford it and I am heartily in favor of seeing the plan carried out."

Mrs. Raymond McKennon said, "It is to be hoped that the proposed movement for serving milk in the lower grades may meet with the co-operation of all concerned. The effect of serving the milk, at a regular hour, will undoubtedly be noticeable in increased efficiency both physical and mental."

## Crash Victim Improves.

HILSBORO, Ore.—Mrs. Mary Hult, 71 years old, who had her skull fractured in an automobile collision near here Friday, will probably recover, attendants at the Smith hospital stated yesterday. The automobile which collided with the Hult car was driven by L. D. Johnson, 722 East Seventy-fourth street, North, Portland, a salesman, and not by E. H. Kelly, as Portland was reported. Mr. Kelly was the recipient, but was not involved in it. The collision occurred when Johnson drove out from behind a truck into the path of the Hult automobile, injuring L. V. Hult and Gordon Hult as well as Mrs. Hult.

At present the members of the exchange are working on an evaporating and by-products plan to take care of the large tonnage of cull apples grown in Union county each year, which usually go to waste. If this plan is successfully completed some profit will be realized on the inferior grade of apples during years when the market is bad and this will also make it possible to use all cull apples grown in the county.

## OFFICERS RAID STILL

**SANDY, Ore.**—A dirty distilled liquid was flowing from a big still hidden in a secluded spot on the north fork of Eagle creek when deputy sheriffs and prohibition officers swooped down upon the place and interrupted the noon meal of three men who were charged with operating the still. The men refused to give their names. The officers reported that the liquor was being made under conditions that assured a highly poisonous product.

Twenty gallons of finished product was seized and a 150-gallon mash tank was destroyed. The outfit had been operating for two weeks, officers reported. The still was located on the J. R. Akin place and is said to be the third that had been found on this property.

The raid was conducted by Deputy Sheriff Duncan and Tempe of Sandy and Officers Shasta and Kelly from Oregon City.

cutting off telegraphic communication, blowing down telephone lines to the south, putting the city in darkness intermittently and causing several fires.

At 8 o'clock the storm had not abated in intensity. A 50-mile gale was blowing and the power lines were expected to go down any minute. Telephone connections with Portland were accomplished with difficulty.

The fire department was out answering numerous calls. Troubles with chimneys and fires set by candles and oil lamps which were pressed into use were responsible for four alarms within 45 minutes after the storm broke.

## Yesterday In Washington

The tax bill continued before the senate.

The house passed the agricultural appropriation bill.

A reply to the Mexican oil land note was started on its way.

A house committee considered placing prohibition agents under civil service.

Additional charges were made against the internal revenue bureau by a senate investigating committee.

An increase of the river and harbor fund from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 was recommended by President Coolidge.

The White House made public the president's views on recent questions in dispute and Senator Harrison replied in the senate.

## TO ERECT \$125,000 HOTEL.

PORTLAND, Ore.—Plans were inaugurated for the erection of a modern tourist hotel costing \$125,000 on the site of Cloud Cap Inn on the slope of Mount Hood at a meeting January 26, presided over by L. R. Wheeler. The committee, which holds the property, decided to start a financial campaign in the near future with the idea of starting the erection of the first unit of the new hotel this spring. Preliminary drawings for the new hotel have already been prepared by A. L. Doyle and provide for large dining room, lounge quarters and sleeping rooms. The building itself would be of rambling type, rather more European than American in design.

The plan contemplates the hooking of tourists from all parts of the country at the hotel just as they
