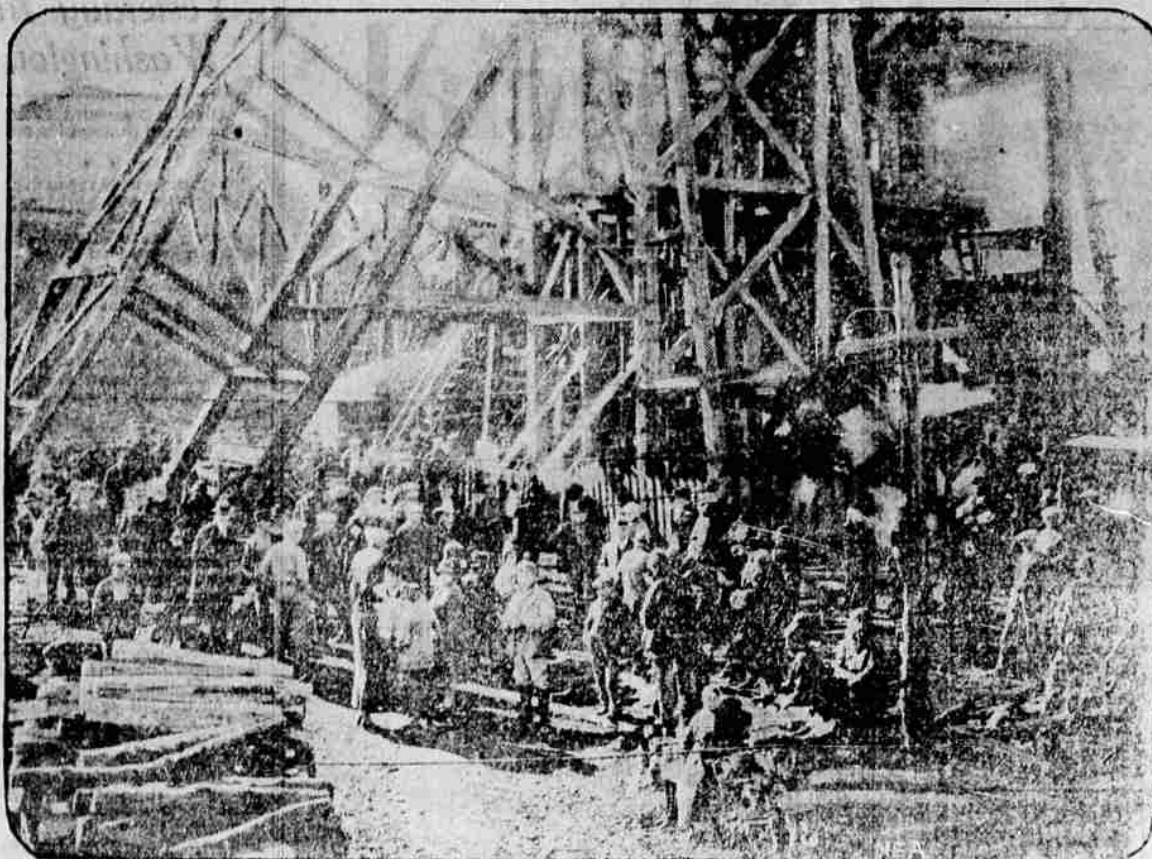

WHERE 91 MEN WERE KILLED IN EXPLOSION



The picture shows the scene at the Deann-McConnell mine, near Wilburton, Okla., just after an explosion within the mine entombed 91 men and took a death toll of 91. A crowd of mothers, wives, children and other relatives of the entombed men by stood for long hours watching the work of removing the bodies, which were brought up in an iron kettle and identified one by one. It was one of the most disastrous mine accidents in recent years.
