"Goose Woman" Booked For Arcade

Rex Beach's "The Goose Woman" has been made into a Uni-

Famous Police Dog Plays Lead in "North Star"

Strongheart, the first and greatest dog actor, has yet another suc-

cess to his record, the story being "North Star", the latest Associated Exhibitors release, which is coming to the Star theater Friday and Saturday.

Strongheart, the dog whose dignity and character have made him the object of worship to most children and dog-loving adults, began his colorful career as a police dog and Red Cross dog during the war. For months he carried aid to wounded soldiers and rescued men lost out on No Man's Land.

When the Armistice tolled, the knight of fighting, Strongheart was sought out by Americans and was shipped across the ocean. At this time, Miss Jane Murfin and Lawrence Trimble, the latter a motion picture producer and writer, were the owners of a scenario in which they saw tremendous possibilities if the right dog could be secured. The manuscript had been in Trimble's hands for some time and many dogs had been inspected with a view to their purchase for the role, but none had the character nor the intelligence necessary.

Strongheart made such a favorable impression upon Trimble and Miss Murfin that he was purchased by the latter and given a trainer to prepare him for his new profession. He showed such an intelligent response that in almost no time he was ready for the filming of the picture.

This all led up to "The Silent Call", the picture which made motion picture history and which first introduced the dog as an actor to the industry. Two original stories by Trimble were the next Strongheart vehicles, "Heaven of the North" and "The Love Master", which created quite a furore, with the dog making personal appearances and enjoying all the adulation of any other celebrated star.

"White Fang", the great Jack London story, was the next to be filmed, and was followed by the present release, "North Star."

This is the first picture Strongheart has made for Associated Exhibitors, although several other of his pictures are scheduled for production and release by this firm in the near future. Howard E. Estabrook handles these productions. Paul Powell directs.

Kansas Imports Mexican Quail as Farm Labor

TOPEKA, Kan., (AP) — Kansas has found a way to import farm labor without running afoul of the immigration authorities. The state has just imported 5,000 quail from Mexico to help out the Kansas farmers. They are expected to eat up 125,000 insects during next summer, and, with their brood of young "bobby white" to destroy at least a quarter of a billion weed seeds by autumn.

The Mexican quail is slightly smaller than the native bob white of Kansas, but the state game warden is assured that the two will interbreed. He estimates conservatively that the purchase of 5,000 birds will bring Kansas 25,000 young quail next summer.

Woodstock Industry Shows Rapid Growth in England

NEWMARKET, Eng. (AP) — Breeders of racehorses and bloodstock generally are of the opinion this industry has developed into one of Britain's best. Export demand has grown to such extent of late years that England is said to be supplying the world with bloodstock.

At the December sales here there were buyers from no less than fifteen countries, including the United States and South America. American buyers are said to be the keenest and buy only the very best thoroughbred animals for stud purposes.

1680-Acre Farm Bought
