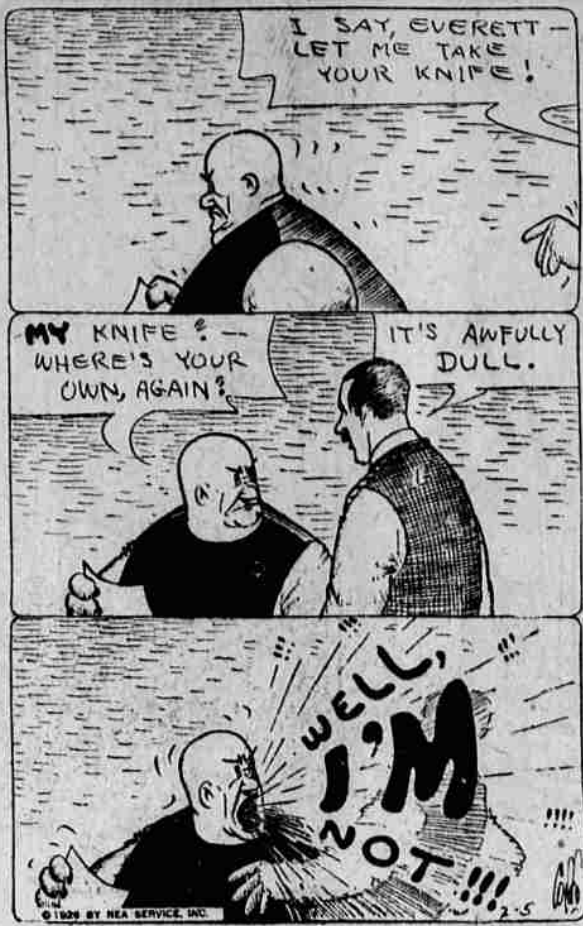

Screen Tale of Rex Beach Novel Scores at Arcade

Louise Dresser plays in one of the most superb roles in her career in "The Goose Woman," a Universal Jewel adapted from the story by Rex Beach, which is now showing at the Arcade Theatre.

As a broken, degraded, once popular opera singer, she gives a sympathetic study of the character she portrays. Casting aside her real beauty, Miss Dresser plays a role quite hideous, yet tremendously artistic in the makeup, as an old drunken woman living in a small dilapidated farm house.

This tragic figure, once glorious and heralded in the newspapers, is the near-witness to a murder. Seeking publicity, she fashions a story from the air and gets her son arrested for the crime.

Miss Dresser's make-up in this part was said to have taken an hour and a half to put on. This is easily creditable when one sees the comparison between the stately singer and the broken siren.

In the cast of this all-star picture two other notable parts are played by Jack Pickford and Constance Bennett. A dramatic part is furnished by James O. Barrows in the part of the killer. Although short, his role is exceedingly well done.

Others in the cast of Clarence Brown's great classic are George Cooper, Gustav von Seyffertitz, George Nichols, Marc MacDermott and Spottiswood Allen.

Dog's Loyalty To Boy Is Theme of Film

Strongheart as a loyal friend by no means a new role for this famous dog actor of the movies. Yet each performance given by Strongheart seems to differ from the last, and in the newest of his pictures he is "North Star" and not "White Fang" or any of the roles in which he has been cast in previous productions.

"North Star" is the title of his latest vehicle, an Associated Exhibitors' production, running at the Star Theatre today and Saturday, with Virginia Lee Corbin, Ken Maynard and Stuart Holmes in the principal roles.

As "North Star" Strongheart is the only friend of young Wilbur Galt, a young shepherd boy, whose sister, Marcia, cannot guard him from the parasites whom he calls "trolls," robbers, the worst of which, contrive to make the boy think he has killed another of his enemies, and the boy runs away, not aware that the dog has followed and is hiding in the back seat of the machine.

Up in the night woods the two are separated, and both are in a grilling mood. During which "North Star" ingeniously is cleverly shown. He makes a friend in the person of Noel Blake, and brings about the friendship of Blake and Marcia when Marcia Robbins enters the scene, seeking the boy. The dog's enmity toward Robbins eventually reveals the latter's character, and leads to the finding of the boy.

The final and most powerful scene is that in which "North Star" pursues Robbins through the hills and in which Robbins plunges over a precipice in an attempt to flee from the angry animal.

The story is said to be even more tremendously portrayed on the screen than in the novel of the same name by Rufus King, from which the picture was adapted. The cast is a particularly well chosen one, containing many familiar names. The photography takes in some of the most beautiful scenery seen on the screen for some time.
