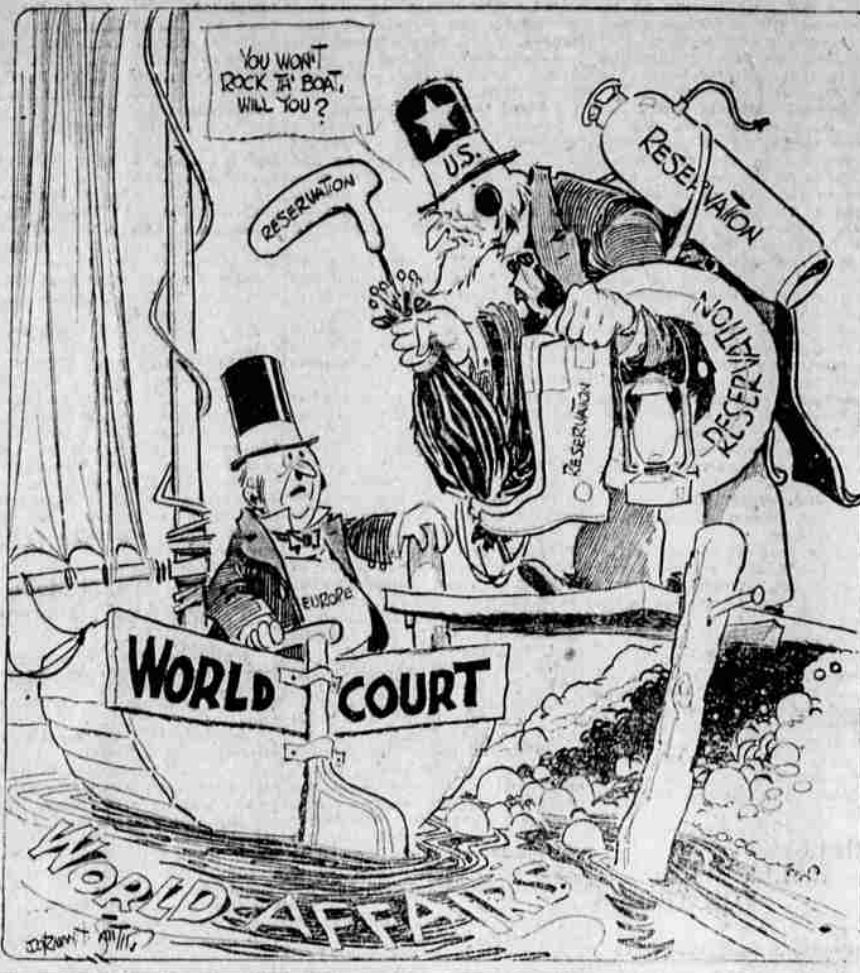

PENDLETON, Ore.—Grades that will be the same in New York as in Oregon and recognized in all markets must be established before cooperative marketing of farm products can be successful in the greatest measure, according to a statement made here yesterday by J. T. Jardine, director of experiment work of Oregon Agricultural college, in a talk before the Rotary club.

The matter of having standard grades for staple crops is not so important, but fruits and vegetables must be graded carefully and according to widely established standards, Mr. Jardine declared.
