**Nestucca Closing Favored.**  
McMINNVILLE, Ore. -- Closing of the Big and Nestucca rivers and the Nestucca bay, all in Tillamook county, were favored by resolutions adopted here last night at a meeting of the Yamhill County Sportmen's association. Twenty-five men attended.

The sportmen also went on record for the closing of the 1926 season on all upland birds in Yamhill county and approved by resolution the action of the state fish commission in closing for 10 years all trout fishing in Haselton, Hasel and Deer creeks in this county.

A warm three-hour discussion was precipitated by Ed Palms of Dallas, who led the movement to stop commercial fishing on the Tillamook rivers.

**Crude Oil Freight Rate Reduced**

SALLEM, Ore. -- The public service commission authorized the Mount Hood Loop Railroad company to reduce its rates on crude oil hauled from Hood River to Parkdale from 21 cents to 14 cents for 100 pounds.
