Miss Isabelle Miller sang "Teach Us to Pray" as a solo at the First Baptist morning worship hour. Communion service brought out an unusually large congregation.

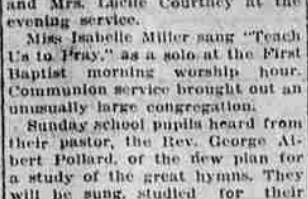

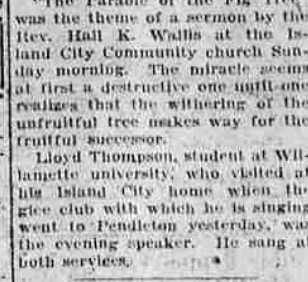
