CHINOOK WIND HITS WALLOWA

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—Mid spring-like weather has held sway here during the past week. A warm chinook wind cut the snow rapidly the latter part of the week, causing the water to run everywhere. The greater part of the moisture is running off at this time as the ground is still frozen.

The ground is now able to be mowed again on Tuesday, and no doubt will be mowed somewhat earlier by the abnormal weather conditions. Many are inclined to think that the latter end of the winter season will bring forth some severe weather. The thawing weather followed by freezing at night causes the surface of the ground to be covered with a crust of ice each morning, which makes travel on the roads nearly impossible with anything except sharp-shod horses. Many robins,

meadow larks, grouse and other birds are noticed in many parts of the country at this time. The most of the wheat fields are still covered with a thin rill of snow, which will be considerable protection should freezing weather come before more snow falls. Much root lunch-corn has again been uncovered and stock have the feed yards and straw stacks each day to feed. The winter so far has been one favorable to farmers and stockmen who were not supplied with an abundance of feed. Stock have done exceptionally well in this section this winter, with many of them being in much better shape than usual at this time of the winter.

Females Decreasing in Ratio to Males in Japan

TOKYO, (AP)—The female population of Japan with reference to the ratio to the male population is decreasing figures of the last national census disclose. The census gives the population of Japan proper (excluding Saghalien, Formosa and the South Sea Possessions) as 55,756,704, an increase of 2,704,000 in five years, or an average annual increase of about 750,000.

Of the total population 29,017,820 are males, exceeding the number of females by 288,555. This means 100 females for every 101 males. Five years ago the ratio was 100 females for every 100.4 males.

The density of the population is shown to be 157 for every square kilometer.

The city of Osaka leads all other cities in number of population which is 2,114,500, followed by Tokyo's 1,925,202, Nagoya's 753,240, Kyoto's 679,576, Kobe's 611,212 and Yokohama's 465,588.

Psene's Painting of Christ Is Found in Church Attic

BERLIN, (AP)—Able explorer, now a popular painter in Germany, has resulted in the discovery by Dr. Karl Walter, art historian, of Gairdrie Psene's painting "The Birth of Christ," which 150 years ago was removed from St. Hedwig's Roman Catholic church in Berlin because the congregation objected to the low-cut robes of the Virgin.

The modern congregation of St. Hedwig's has ordered the painting cleaned and rehung in the church.

Dr. Walter, tramping through two recently discovered art treasures, read that some, a French painter attached to the court of Frederick the Great, had been commissioned to paint "The Birth of Christ" as an altar piece for the church.

He searched the crates of the atheistic monarch in Potsdam and Rheinsberg, but did not find the painting. It finally was discovered in the attic of St. Hedwig's covered with cobwebs and dust.
