Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)
Breakfast—Scalloped oysters, corn, cereal, fruit, bread, coffee, whole wheat toast, codfish and potato puff, milk, coffee.
Luncheon—Bacon and lettuce sandwiches, steamed fig pudding, milk, tea.
Dinner—Scalloped mutton, buttered Brussels sprouts, jellied fruit salad, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The scalloped mutton is a combination dish furnishing both protein and carbohydrates. No dessert is planned for the dinner menu, the fruit salad making a sweet unnecessary.

This steamed fig pudding is a little unusual and the sauce is so simple that it's worth remembering.

One-third cup butter, two-third cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup chopped figs, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream butter and heat in sugar. Stir in 2 tablespoons flour. Add yolks of eggs well beaten. Mix and add flour, salt and baking powder and add alternately with milk to first mixture. Stir in eggs and fold in the whites of the eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into individual well-buttered molds and steam 45 minutes. Unmold and serve warm with the following sauce.

Orange Sauce

Two eggs, 1 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons grated orange rind, 4 tablespoons orange juice, 1/2 cup butter. Beat eggs until light with a dash of sugar. Beat in sugar and grated rind. Beat in orange juice and serve. The fruit will thin the sauce slightly.

Inland Empire Group Organizes in Order to Further Aid District

SPOKANE, Wash.—Articles of incorporation were forwarded recently to Olympia by the Blue Mountain Radio association, a non-profit, non-business organization, formed to promote more widespread interest in radio and particularly to help station KPCW at Walla Walla, Wash.

Objects of corporation include: To assist, financially and otherwise, in maintaining and operation a radio broadcasting station in Walla Walla, and in establishing, maintaining and operating broadcasting stations elsewhere within the Inland Empire.

No obtain material for broadcasting programs and to promote and encourage improvement of radio programs and the use of radio in exploiting communities and community advantage, and to organize radio patrons in the Inland Empire, are also announced as objects.

Membership certificates are to be issued to members of commerce, business firms and individuals. There will be no capital stock and no shares will be issued. Trustees for the first six months are Benjamin J. Stone, M. L. McMurtry, H. L. Benick, John Cameron, L. R. Hoagland, H. E. Allen and J. D. Moore.
