The entertainment opened with competitive close-order drill between the first and second platoons, with the second platoon, commanded by Lieutenant W. A. Bean, winning.

The first platoon, commanded by Lieutenant A. V. Sanford, won. The three guardsmen who won the race were Lawrence Stearns, Herman Berger and Nepht Combs.

The tent pitching contest, was won by Milan and Clarence Blanchard, members of the first platoon. The first two men to pitch their tent and display their equipment won this race.

Predator Fish Responsible
 For New Texas Industry
 DALLAS, Tex. (AP).—Fossilized remains of prehistoric fish, from which is produced the strange ichthol, are to supply Texas with an anti-modern industry.

In what is believed to be an ancient ocean bed, pushed to the surface by geological action, near Tule in West Texas, has been discovered a particular shale from which ichthol is extracted. This substance is a fossil fish oil used in medicine, especially in ointments and in treatment of skin diseases.

 OREGON CITY, Ore. (AP).—Clifford Sammelson, 17-year-old high school student, will complete his education with a trust egg of \$1000 and an income of \$75 a month—both furnished by the 23-year-old school teacher with whom he eloped last year.

A jury here decided that Mrs. Sammelson was entitled to \$1000 damages from the Oregon high school board because the board fired her for "immoral conduct" following the sensational elopement of the teacher and her pupil last year.

Mr. Sammelson told the jury that she had been working in a Portland department store for \$75 a month since her dismissal last year. She was a member of her high school.

She asked \$25,000 damages.

 WASHINGTON. (AP). Grain export last week from the United States were 3,761,000 bushels against 2,336,000 the previous week.

Commerce department figures Monday gave the following comparisons between last week's exports and those of the week before:

Wheat, 779,000 bushels against 515,000; rye, 202,000 against 30,000; oats, 157,000 against 148,000; corn, 245,000 against 206,000; barley, 65,000 against 277,000.

Canadian grains exported from United States ports were 4,575,000 bushels last week compared with 2,202,000 the previous week, while North American wheat from exports were 128,000 bushels against 97,000 barrels.
