ROAD DAMAGED BY WASHOUTS
WALLAWA, Ore. (Special).
Practically all the snow in this section of the country has been melted away by the rain and warm weather of the past week. The ground still contains much frost, although the greater part of the moisture has run off. At small draws and canyons coming from the hills have been carrying roaring streams of water, blackened with mud. Whiskey creek has been nearly as high the past few days as at any time in former years when the big spring break-up was on. The river has also been high for the past several days. Higher in the hills sections the ground still holds several inches of frost, while at places in the foothills near the valley the frost has begun to go out in places. The roads at many places have washed considerably. The old Parantp creek road east of Duane Lathrop's ranch is reported to have been damaged at a number of places, making it nearly impossible to get over the road with any kind of a rig. While many indications point toward an extremely early spring, many feel that much snow and heavy conditions will be experienced before the weather is settled enough to allow any farm work.

train to Kyoto. Here we found a representative Japanese city, undamaged by the earthquake. It is a great shopping center. Sunday we spent walking about Kyoto, visiting the stores and hunting for the quaint out-of-the-way places.
Monday we went sight seeing in richu-ku and had luncheon at the famous Oriental hotel. A visit to the cloisonne factory proved most interesting. Kyoto has a fine location at the entrance to the inland sea and has become a great shipping center with a business district essentially modern. Many large warehouses are now under construction. A modern six-story apartment house is to be opened here this week, the first of its kind in Japan.

Must Use Cloth Shoes
