Bishop Remington addressed the women at 2 o'clock this afternoon, talking over with them several topics concerning their work and advising them in the actions of the league.

New Russian Radio Station

To Have 10,000 Miles Radius

LENNINGRAD, (AP)—Russia is striving to keep pace with the United States and England in radio communication. A number of new stations are in course of construction. The plant at Leningrad will have a radius of 10,000 miles. The aerial masts, 20 in number, will be more than 1,000 feet in height, and regular communications will be maintained with China, Japan, Europe and North America. Long and short waves will be used.
