HORSES TRAIN FOR BIG RACES

LEITCHVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Com- fortably tucked away in winter quarters or being prepared for campaigning on Southern tracks, some 400 three-year-olds are being conditioned for the classic Kentucky derby.

On May 15 only a score or so of them will face the barrier. These will be greeted by the thundering applause of thousands of persons at historic old Churchill Downs and at the end of the mile and a quarter race one of them will find fame and fortune awaiting. Mean- time, hopes will be mingled with disappointments as one by one the prospective candidates for the \$50,000 classic will be found wanting and withdrawn.

These horse dope and dissects of performances show three of the juveniles standing out as "winter favorites" for the race. Two others also above the average will be pointed for the Derby and winter racing may add others before the nominations close.

Bubbling Over, E. H. Bradley's best bet since his behavior, Yourself and Black Servant ran one-two in the 1921 Derby; Carter, J. E. Griffith's Maryland-bred winner of the Pimlico Futurity, and Pompey, champion two-year-old, are the big three today.

Rhinoc, winner of the Golden Rod Handicap on the closing day of the fall meet here, and Chicago have been coming along nicely. Mrs. George H. Cox owns Rhinoc and Chicago belongs to Fred Grabner.

In the opinion of some turf authorities, Bubbling Over gets the call over Carter, although the latter nosed out the Bradley colt in the Rich Pimlico Futurity. In that race, Carter got to the winning post in the last stride. He carried 177 pounds up, however, to 122 carried by Bubbling Over. The poundage given Carter is about equal to the weight of a male pig, according to some handicap systems. If the two colts had been equally weighted, it was Bubbling Over's second defeat of the year, while Carter had been beaten badly several times.

Carter's victory in the Pimlico Futurity made him the second largest money winner of the two-year-olds last year, his earnings being about \$104,000.

Pompey, the leading money winner of 1925 for all ages, beat Carter and a number of other good youngsters in winning the Saratoga Hopeful and the Belmont Futurity, two rich stakes for juveniles. He is wintering at the Lexington, Ky., farm of his owner, W. H. Lee.

Pompey's dam, Cleopatra, was one of the best race fillies this country has seen in some time. His sire is Wildair, a Whitney bred horse, which came along about the time Man o' War was establishing a sensational record.

practically every major league manager likes to play golf as a diversion; a good way to forget his baseball work.

Once upon a time the golf craze got so strong with the Philadelphia Athletics that Connie Mack officially notified the players that he would do all the golfing for the team during the summer months.

That was seven or eight years ago but I understand that Mack has lived up to the ultimatum. Only on an off day do his players have permission to hit the elusive golf ball.

Most ball players become quite proficient at the game. There are any number of players who are at least in the eighties. All get great distance from the tee; most of them are weak at the short game.

Former Dutch Leonard and First baseman Johnny McInnis are two players who often break into the seventies.

As I understand it, Eddie Collins is about the only big league manager who doesn't put an absolute ban on golf during the summer. He leaves it up to his players to use proper judgment as to when they should and shouldn't play.

The chief objection to golf does not lie in injurious effects from swinging the club but simply that it takes much of the player's reserve energy that is often needed on a hot day.

Two Stills Found in Wilderness
KIAMATH FALLS, Ore.—Prohibition officers returned here from the wilderness of Klamath timber, 100 miles north of this city, being word of the arrest of Gus Frederickson and W. S. Jacobs on the charge of operating two stills in a cleverly hidden shack, 15 miles east of Crescent.

Eskimos Save Fuel Supply
Threatened by Rising Sea

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP)—A desperate fight by Eskimos to save a winter's supply of coal from the elements has been reported by Dr. W. A. Newhall, pastor of Trinity mission in the vicinity of Point Barrow, northernmost tip of Alaska.

The fact had been landed on the beach from a supply ship when a storm, described as the worst in years, broke. Rain accompanied by snow and hail fell, and wind drove sand and fine pebbles before it. The rising sea soon was lapping against the mammoth pile of sacked coal.

Without waiting for suggestions or orders, the natives, men, women and children fell to work moving the heavy bags to safety. For four hours, until well past midnight, the labor continued. The men carried the sacks on their backs, while the women and children dugged and

dragged them through the shifting sand until the more than 100 tons of coal had been placed out of reach of the waves.

IDAHO WOOL BRINGS 27 TO 39 CENTS AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—About half of the million pounds of 1925 Idaho wool offered at sealed bid sale here Thursday was disposed of. Prices ranged from 24 to 33 cents.
