The well flow, besides augmenting the pipeline, is large enough to carry the city through any emergency that may develop, it is said.

How Struck at 935 Feet

The well came in at a depth of 935 feet, 130 feet further down than the first flow which yielded only a few gallons a minute. The temperature of the water is 62 degrees, which is satisfactory, officials declare.

More than 100 people tasted the water today and none could detect any mineral matter and all declared that the water is "good." No chemical tests have been made but it is obvious that the water will satisfy, it is said.

He will use three methods of extermination—the gun, the trap, and poison.

His duties will first take him to the southern part of the county and then in the vicinity of Summerville and Starkey where the situation is said to be worse.

Incidentally, the returns from furs of animals slain will be sent here, which will serve to carry on the work into the far future.

In case of another appropriation, another 12 months would be assured.

Stockmen and farmers are reported to be greatly pleased with the action of the county officials in making arrangements for the work, which will be supervised by the government. Nearby counties have also expressed their pleasure at the step.

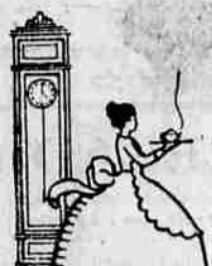
Miss Pearson Tells How She Budgets Time
