 well as by the courts. And its abuse encourages the commission of crime, and at the same time does not punish the criminal.
Advises to Recommendations.
 "I am going to recommend to the jury, passes on a case. You have a wife and children to support, although I believe you should have thought of that before you committed the crime.
 "I am going to relieve you from the jail sentence of 30 days, as you live the life of a law-abiding citizen and abstain from the use of intoxicating liquor."
 The prisoner's conviction automatically revokes his driver's license for the period of one year.
Bradford Before Judge.
 Robert Bradford was called before the bench immediately after the sentence pronounced to hear the indictment of the grand jury against him, charging unlawful possession of Mash. Bradford was arrested by prohibition officers November 10, 1925. The judge permitted him until 10 a. m. Tuesday to enter his plea.

 the low Canadian rates. Frank McKenyon of Allet was a member of this committee.
 The tollage and production committee, with Harry B. Pinkerton as chairman and D. E. Stephens, superintendent of the Moro experiment station, as secretary, reported twenty-three fillage and production practices. Reports from all experiments at the Moro station since 1910 were available.
 This report brought out that from three to five bushels in yield are lost by late plowing as compared with early plowing of ground for summer fallow. Also tests indicating that eight years or more show that, in general the advantages gained
