 during the semester just closed.

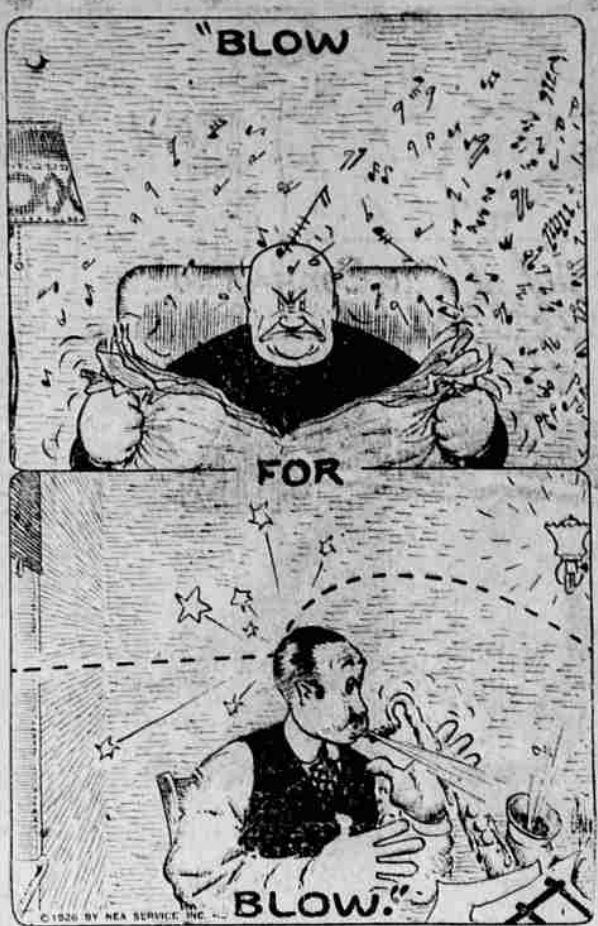
In all, about ninety persons were
