Two weeks ago, when he was visiting in Los Angeles, Dr. Smith said he heard it stated that the size of any city depends upon its ability to supply pure water to its residents. Other conditions being equal, a municipality will continue to grow as long as plenty of good water is available. Los Angeles is at present planning to bring water from the Rocky mountain regions to assure an unlimited supply for home and industrial purposes.

TUNNEL WILL BE BUILT

EUGENE, Ore.—The A. D. Kern construction company of Portland has started work on the new Eugene municipal water supply system at the McKenzie river end of the eight-mile pipe line and good progress has been made on a tunnel under the river through which the main will be extended.

The intake will be on the north side of the river on ground purchased recently by the water board and the pipeline will cross the river a short distance above the Hayden bridge. It was at first planned to lay the line on the bed of the stream, but afterward it was decided it would be better to tunnel.

PRISON IS CALM AFTER GANG RIOT

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C. R. Moor, shot twice, one bullet grazing his head, the other passing through his shoulder, is serving his third term in prison now for larceny. He faces 14 indictments in California.

Pat Burke, from Multnomah county, serving 10 years for attacking a woman.

Howard Smith of Multnomah county, serving 21 years for assault and robbery with a dangerous weapon.

J. N. James, serving an 8-year term, sent up from Wasco for attacking a woman.

Prison officers this morning picked out six convicts as leaders of the riot and they were sent to the bullpen. Several more are expected to be so confined.

Charles Murray and William Strout, charged with setting fire to the flag plant, are also in the bullpen today.

Riot Leaders Named
 Convicts charged with leading the riot are: Alvin Adams, Multnomah county, under a sentence of 15 years; Roy Alba, Lantira, Multnomah, two years; Richard Moore, Multnomah, 10 years; Edward Murray, Josephine, one year.

Either Adams or Lantira is suspected of having given the signal which started the riot. None of these men were among those wounded by the shooting.
