PARIS (AP)—Tailor's dummies which move their lips, eyes and heads by means of electric motors hidden in their chests, is the Paris tailors' latest step to make his models lifelike.

The first radical movement to make shop-window dummies resemble human beings was the abolition of the "Adonis" type of male beauty. Everywhere in Paris now Adonis is outnumbered by the corpulent, the undersized, the plain-featured, the cross-eyed and the broken-nosed dummy.

The faces of these dummies are composed of a new material called "stucco," a mixture of fibre and plaster, which is far less brittle than wax and permits of more natural coloring.

whole wheat bread, apricot whip, plain cake, milk, coffee.

of age. Chill Con Carne

One tablespoon lard, 1 pound round steak 3 cups canned tomatoes, 2 cups cooked kidney beans, 1 large onion, 1 clove garlic, 3 chili peppers, salt.

About 1 cup of dried beans will be needed. Soak overnight, parboil in soda water, drain and cook until tender. Drain before adding to meat.

Melt lard and brown meat in it. Add onion and garlic finely minced. Reduce heat and cook until onion is a pale straw color. Remove seeds from peppers. Pour over 1 cup of boiling water and let stand ten minutes. Rub through a colander. Add water and pulp to meat with tomatoes, and simmer for two hours. Season with salt to taste. From 1 to 2 teaspoons will be needed. Add beans and cook 30 minutes longer.
