STOMACH ILLD EXEMPT

SALEM, Ore.—The mere taking of a drink of intoxicating liquor, at the invitation of a friend, does not constitute unlawful possession of the same within the meaning of the Oregon statutes, according to an opinion written by Justice Harry Bell and handed down by the state supreme court today.

The opinion was written in the case of the state of Oregon against Elmer Williams, who was arrested in Tillamook county on a charge of unlawful possession of liquor. At the trial of the case, a verdict of guilty was directed by Judge George G. Bagley on the ground that the facts stipulated did not constitute the crime charged. The state then appealed the case to the supreme court for final determination.

WOMAN, 51, HANGS SELF

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore.—Despondent because of ill health, Mrs. Pearl G. Sutton, 51, wife of Frank Sutton, hanged herself this morning in the basement of their general merchandise store near here. The couple constructed a service station and general store on the highway north of Klamath Falls. Recently they abandoned the store and constructed a new building on Williamson river.

Besides her widower, two sons, Lester and Martin, and a brother and sister in Ashland survive. Funeral services will probably be held in Ashland.

Masonic Temple Damaged.

HILLSBORO, Ore.—Fire caused \$2000 damage to the interior and furnishings of the new Masonic temple here. The fire started in the furnace room and swept through the air ducts to other parts of the building, which is a three-story structure. SPRING EVIDENCE GROWS

TOLEDO, Ore.—Warm sunshine and spring showers, wild flowers blooming and early fruit trees budding and plum trees in blossom, this is Lincoln county's answer to the scientists' prediction of sun spots and a cold, late spring for 1926.

Pastures have been growing all winter and butchers are killing choice beef from off the grass, a thing not often possible even on the coast. Farmers have used the least hay in years; hay prices are weakening. Spring lambs are arriving and with good pasture available will be ready for the block at an early date.

Spring seeding and early garden and potato planting are in evidence already.

OREGON DAIRYMEN MEET

ASTORIA, Ore.—With 100 or more dairymen in attendance, the Oregon dairymen's annual convention opened here. The dairy-

men were welcomed by Mayor Sorenson and at once started their program, with C. W. Laughlin of Astoria, president, presiding.

Addresses dealing with the marketing and manufacturing divisions of the dairy industry were made by M. N. Honey of Eugene and C. L. Mitchell, production expert of the Challenge Butter and Cream association of Los Angeles, Cal.

Chris Johnson, field man for the North Pacific creamery, talked on dairy methods. E. F. Flynn, general counsel for the Great Northern railroad, spoke on the advantages of doing business the right way.

Checks Cause Man's Arrest

Horace Knapp, street and water superintendent, told of the lay of the land, the soil formation and indications of seepage that he had observed about the home of Mrs. Welton when he went to that vicinity last spring to repair a water main.

Mrs. Welton's illness was described by Dr. Stella Bodmer, who declared that in her opinion the dampness of the house, resulting from the standing water in the cellar, had aggravated her patient's condition and caused her to relapse into influenza that continued until Mrs. Welton moved from the house.

Counsel for the defense sought to bring from Dr. Bodmer a statement that dampness aids rather than hinders in the fight against influenza, but the young physician emphatically informed the jury that the disease runs highest in the rainy months.
