## Henry Memorial Prize Awarded to Julian Street

NEW YORK (AP)—The Society of Arts and Sciences announces that Julian Street is the winner of the O. Henry memorial prize of \$500 for the best short story by an American writer published in an American magazine during 1925.  
 The story for which the prize was awarded was "Mr. Bixbee's Princess," and which will lead the contents of the 1926 volume of O. Henry memorial award prize stories, which Doubleday Page and Company will soon publish.  
 "Tying with 'Mr. Bixbee's Princess' for first prize was Wilbur Daniel Steele's "The Man Who Saw Through Heaven," but as Mr. Steele has won two prizes from the society, he was barred from the money award. The second prize of \$250 goes to Wythe Williams for his "Splendid With Swords." Mary Austin's "Papago Whirling" took the prize of \$100 for the best brief story.

## Alon to U. S. Fleet Cost Hawaii Seventy Thousand

HONOLULU (AP)—Cost to the territory of welcoming the United States fleet and entertaining its personnel during the last annual maneuvers was \$71,302, which was \$3,497 less than appropriated for the purpose by the legislature.

### "The Bloodhound" At Sherrys Today Only

The drifted, snow-laden trails of the White Country late which only the temper, the desperado and the Royal Northwest Mounted Police dare venture, form a beautiful scenic background for "The Bloodhound," a story which has the speed and power of a battery of sixteen inch guns. The tale fairly hums through to a "punch" scene not often equalled; in fact to suffer a "punch" scene would be a more accurate description. In addition to having very difficult stunts to do in the way of driving a dog-team, and shooting the Peace River rapids in his canoe, Bob Foster is cast in a dual role and gives two brilliant performances of highly divergent characters; one as Jack Belleau, the never-dull brother and the other as Sergeant McKenna, of the Mounted, who is known as "The Bloodhound." Mary Beth Milford, Ralph McCullough, Emily Barry and David Dunbar are among those who support the star most ably.

### "The Enchanted Hill" Offers Something A Little Different

Every once in a while there suddenly appears on the film horizon a motion picture that offers something new in the way of story and theme. Originally in photoplays—especially westerns—is mighty rare and for that very reason, "The Enchanted Hill," the new outdoor melodrama, at the star theater today and Saturday, deserves to be singled out for special and honorable mention.  
 It is Paramount's screen version of Peter H. Kyne's vivid novel, and was produced by Irvin Willat with an all-star cast featuring Jack Holt, Florence Vidor, Noah Berry, and Mary Brian.  
 The background of the story is the vast, picturesque Southwest land of romance, adventure, gold, and rugged men. The principal characters in the modern tale are Lee Purdy, a gay and gallant ex-army aviator, who buys and settles on a ranch in New Mexico, and Gail Ormsby, who inherits the adjoining ranch from her uncle.  
 Here is the beginning of a first-rate love story that takes an unexpected turn when the girl, for some mysterious reason, evinces a strong dislike for her neighbor. Further complications set in, when a band of invaders attempt to kill Purdy so as to get hold of his ranch, on which, unknown to him, there is a buried treasure.  
 From this point the action is fast and furious. The subsequent events are charged with excitement and thrills for Purdy uses airplane and machine gun to fight his enemies to the bitter finish. Jack Holt gives a vigorous account of himself in the leading male role; Florence Vidor makes a charming heroine; Noah Berry is, as usual, a very effective "bad man"; and Mary Brian wins new laurels in a lovable characterization.  
 This feature picture and the Harry Langdon comedy make up a program that is hard to better.

Woman Holds Front Rank in Minneapolis Symphony

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Disregarding conventions which have ruled out women from many ranking symphony orchestras in the United States, Miss Jenny Cullen, a first violinist, continues her post as the only woman major in the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra of eighty-seven pieces.  
 The fact that she occupies a first row position near the conductor's stand is not altogether the result of courtesy to her, for Miss Cullen is one of the ten first violinists with the symphony. She has appeared several times as soloist at the Sunday "popular" concert.  
 Miss Cullen for many years was concert-master of the famous State Symphony Orchestra of Sydney, Australia. Previous to that she was a playing member of the renowned Scottish Orchestra of Glasgow, Scotland.
