The Garden

Annuals for the most part, given proper treatment are as effective as perennials and usually give a greater wealth of bloom over a longer season. They are indispensable for furnishing a supply of bloom all summer and keeping the garden gay when perennials have gone out of bloom or are yet

to give their display. They are the chosen officers of the perennial, filling the branches and keeping the display hooked up from spring till frost. But the annuals receive poor treatment as earnestly as the perennial. It needs a careful soil preparation, cultivation, fertilizing and room to grow.
