GIRLS WIN; GAME GIVES TEAM TITLE

lent showing. The Union forward, who has been off the lineup for some time because of illness, went in the game shortly after the second half began, when the score stood: La Grande 14, Union 10. She began her scoring with a point after foul and from then on contributed 16 more points, registering a basket nearly every time she got possession of the ball.

Courtney and Campbell, with better support from their teammates, enabled La Grande to keep the lead, however, although at one time Union nearly passed the Tigresses, running the score from 18 to 24 while La Grande's blackboard read 22.

With a star of her brilliance on the opposing team, the La Grande girls' teamwork served them in good stead. Effective guarding by Nelson and Reynolds prevented Springer from getting half a dozen layups and snappy work on the part of Stango and Owen, centers, broke up many Union offensive drives and turned the offense into La Grande's hands.

Team Undelected. By winning last night Miss Johnson's proteges kept their state clear and gave Miss Johnson the enviable record of having turned out an undefeated team in her first year of coaching. It is not likely that any other games will be played by the girls this year.

Courtney scored first for La Grande and at the end of the first quarter the Tigresses led 4 to 1. In the second quarter both Campbell and Courtney found the basket for 7 points while Stango and Weaver, Union forwards, scored twice from the court. At one time in this frame Union led 15 to 4.

Going into the second half with a four-point lead, La Grande maintained it until Springer got into the game, when the rally started that nearly resulted in success. In the final quarter the Tigresses started a rally of their own and scored enough points to give them five points in the clear when the pistol's bark ended the game.

Courtney played one of her best games of the year, scoring 10 points to Campbell's 16 and playing her position in the most approved fashion.

Trans Entertained. Following the two games the girls entertained the boys' net in the domestic science room and the grade school boys entertained their opponents at the gym, with the Hi-Dads as guests.

From reports received here today it seems that La Grande played a nip-and-tuck ball during the greater part of the first half, but when the Buckaroos sharply shot their eyes, La Grande's charges were thrust into oblivion. To add to their downfall, Union was removed in the third quarter for fouling.

Johnson and Hutton, who were held down here when the Tigress triumphed Pendleton 26 to 15, scored 23 of their team's points.

A Pendleton newspaper reports that the officiating was closer than La Grande has been accustomed to.

Patriotic programs, consisting mainly of songs, recitations and talks, both by the teachers and by the children, will be given in the grade schools, Central, Elvira, Greenwood and Willow.

No community meetings have been planned, but civic and cultural clubs will take notice of the holiday in their meetings next week, and practically every resident of La Grande will feel the quickened spirit of patriotism that results.

TIA JUANA LAUGHS AT SHAME CASE

Not one place of pleasure or den of iniquity has been closed here excepting the Oakland bar where the Petrol girls were first denounced by Luis Amador, proprietor.

Hotel Nacional where Llanos resided, just around the corner from Tia Juana's dungeon prison. In that tomb of the living dead is rattling into tuberculosis an American sailor, Elmo Kaye Gordon, 31, held on a framed charge by the Mexicans. He has already served six months and 15 days sentence in a dimly-lighted cell.

Gordon, according to a true investigation by Commander J. D. Smith, Captain L. S. Taylor and Dr. J. A. Lopez of the Eleventh District of the United States navy, struck Dora Moreno, a Mexican dance hall girl during an argument.

Mexican authorities claim through agents that Gordon recognized one of the girl's eyes out and that she is now lying near death in a San Diego hospital. This is not so, American naval authorities and secret service men found her working in the Foreign Club, a gambling parlor, only the other day nothing is wrong with her eyes.

Protect Llanos. While Mexican leaders quibble concerning the demands of the U. S. navy heads that the sailor who struck the prostitute be released, an allied path has been paved for the attacker of American women to travel to eventual freedom.

Llanos has too much power, is too big a factor in Mexican political circles to be dealt with harshly," is the unanimously spoken comment here.

The probability that the ex-prostitute may be sentenced to face a firing squad is a joke. An agent of Mayor Palencia, self-appointed monarch, laughed in my face when I mentioned such a sentence for so "trivial a crime."

Amador Not Important. I have not been able to find a single person who believes that Llanos will get any penalty at all. However, some believe that one of the group of miscellaneous attackers who took the drugged girl for themselves after Chief Llanos and Amador had discharged them in the hotel, should be executed to appease the "unkind demands of the United States." It is generally believed that Amador, "who isn't important, anyway," they say, may be shot.
