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that from the three institutions of higher learning in existence at the time of his birth, the number has grown to 113, with a total enrollment of over \$4,000,000 students and over 55,000 teachers, an enrollment of nearly \$15,000,000 and a property value of over \$1,000,000,000. Our elementary and secondary schools have expanded until they provide for more than 24,000,000 pupils and require over \$22,000 teachers. In 1912 the total amount expended yearly for all educational purposes was about \$105,000,000. This has been increasing with great rapidity, until in 1924 it reached \$2,400,000,000.
"This represents the result which has been secured by the carrying out of some of the most important policies of our first president. It should be noted that these are the policies of peace. They are based on a desire for intellectual and moral enlightenment. They are the only means by which misunderstandings, suspicions, hatreds and wars can finally be eradicated from the earth."
