Helix, ex-champions of the Umatilla County Basketball League, defeated the Aggravators of La Grande, last night in the high school gym, despite a desperate rally by the home team during the last half. The final score was 54 to 27.

During the first half, with King dropping in pointers from all angles, the visitors ran up an imposing lead which reached 26 to 12 at the beginning of the third quarter. Nick guarding and slow playing by La Grande accounted for the difference. Helix scored eight points in the first quarter before La Grande scored.

The second half, however, was a different story. The Aggravators lived up to their name and kept the Helix quiet almost entirely on the defense, scoring 15 points to Helix's 11. During the last quarter La Grande ran their total from 18 to 27 while Helix scored one lone field basket.

Stoddard, for La Grande, and King, for Helix, were the outstanding stars and also high point men for their respective teams. King contributed 17 points and Stoddard 11. Nelson was third with 5.

**CHUCK HELLMAN
DEFEATS NEGRO
IN 7TH ROUND**

PORTLAND, Ore. (By the Associated Press)—Chuck Hellman, Portland bantamweight, got credit for a technical knockout over Asaf Bell, negro boxer of New York, last night when the referee stopped the bout in the seventh round. In the sixth he floored Bell twice but the latter was on his feet and apparently not in distress when the fight was stopped in the seventh. The action of the referee was noted and jeered by a part of the spectators.

Nick Wagner, Portland heavy-weight, knocked out Pete Jackson, also of Portland in the fourth round of a bout scheduled to go 10 rounds. Other results were: Tony Hayes, Salem, stopped George Fletcher, Portland in the first round; Frank Paragon, Astoria, wrestler, won a four-round decision over Clare Bromo, San Francisco; All Gracie, Spokane, lightweight, won a four-round decision from Joe Marcus, Portland.

**Schaefer Leads Hoppe
In 18.1 Billiard Play**

CHICAGO (By the Associated Press)—Young Jake Schaefer finished 231 points ahead of Willie Hoppe, 18.1 ball billiard champion, at the end of the first 1000 points of their 1500 point 18.1 exhibition match with a score of 1000 to 749.

Making last night's 200 points in four innings Schaefer set his second world record of the match. His average of 84 1/2 upset the mark set by his father years ago when he averaged 40 points per inning in a 400-point block. Monday night Young Jake established a world record for the 18.1 with an inning total of 212.

Hoppe won Monday's play 100 to 498. Schaefer forged ahead yesterday afternoon and was leading at the half way 624 to 470. They will play the final two blocks today.

**GONZAGA BEATS U. OF W.
SPOKANE** (By the Associated Press)—Gonzaga university defeated the University of Washington team 50 to 24 here last night.
