TYPHOID FEVER

(By Dr. Frederick Stricker)

Typoid fever has shown an apparent increase in prevalence in 1925. Typoid fever is too common in the state of Oregon and active measures are necessary for its prevention. Much disease would be prevented if physicians would report to health authorities all cases of indefinite illness among food handlers as in families of grocers, dairymen, candy and ice cream makers, particularly, if symptoms point toward intestinal or lung involvement.

Persons who sell foods or who prepare foods for sale should realize that if there is any diseased person in their employ, their customers are apt to learn of it and such persons should be of public protection will eventually damage or destroy their business. Those who sell foods exposed to infection make themselves liable to prosecution. Every community should take active control over its milk supply.

Swimming in polluted water accounted for a number of cases of typhoid. The water of all swimming pools should be sterilized during its recirculation.

Campers sometimes contract typhoid infection from the water or food supplies. The well or spring may be contaminated. Most streams are polluted. The only safety lies in boiling or chemical disinfection before using. Persons who contemplate camping should become immunized against typhoid as an added precaution.

Thoughtlessness has resulted in many cases of typhoid fever. Contact infection in typhoid families causes many cases. The family of a typhoid patient should remember that the patient's hands, bedding and eating utensils are constantly infected with typhoid germs, and without constant and extreme care the infection will be transmitted. No matter how careful one may be, the patient's nose should not cook nor handle foods for other persons. The careless disposal of the body discharges from typhoid cases maintains the high development rate of typhoid cases. Both the kidney and intestinal discharges should be sterilized from the beginning of the illness. Typhoid vaccine will prevent typhoid fever but not after the person is already infected. Immunization against typhoid is highly recommended.

WEEKLY GRAIN EXPORTS

WASHINGTON (AP)—Grain exports from the United States for the week ending February 20 totaled 790,000 bushels as compared with 1,312,000 bushels for the week before, the department of commerce reported Tuesday.

Comparative figures showed wheat exports amounted to 181,000 bushels against 355,000; corn 320,000 against 500,000; oats 175,000 against 112,000; barley 24,000 against 17,000 and rye 30,000 against none.

United States and Canadian wheat flour in transit was reported at 231,000 barrels last week, as compared with 155,000 in the week ending February 13. Canadian grain in transit totaled 3,755,000 bushels as compared with 3,428,000.

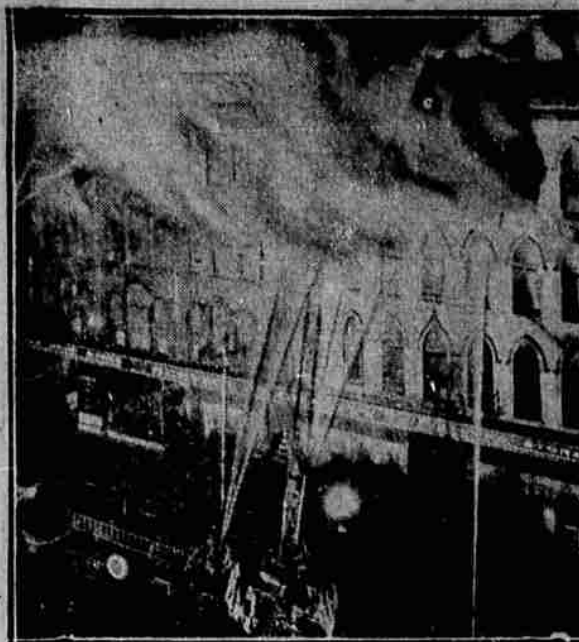
