POTATO PRICES CONTINUE ON 'JEWELRY' BASIS

CHICAGO (AP)—Old Irish potatoes are coming into their own. Near approach of St. Patrick's day has nothing to do with it, either. Reports issued Wednesday by the government bureau of agricultural economics point to considerable smaller southern acreage of new potatoes than last season, and say there is every indication that old potatoes this spring will be without the usual competition. Furthermore, a government report next week is expected to show relatively tight supplies throughout most of the northern states. Already some prices for old Irish potatoes are on a jewelry basis, Idaho Russets and Burbanks selling at just about double last year's figures.

BANK RESOURCES LISTED

WASHINGTON (AP)—Total resources of the 5045 national banks on December 31 last, was announced by the comptroller of the currency Wednesday as \$25,852,412,609. This represented an increase of \$1,361,265,000 over the year.

National bank deposits also showed an increase, the total on December 31, being \$21,050,600,000 which was \$1,050,452,000 greater than those a year ago.

The same banks were carrying investments of \$19,558,171,000 as compared with \$18,236,906,000 December 31, 1924. The continued prosperity of the

national banks was indicated by statistics showing a combined surplus of \$1,360,601,000 last December 31, while a year ago the surplus was reported at \$1,088,800,000.
