Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast — Stewed fish, cereal, thin cream, giddle cake, maple syrup, milk, coffee. Luncheon — Spinach and mushrooms on toast, brown bread, jelly, coconut tapioca, pudding, fruit. Dinner — Stuffed breast of veal, beefs in orange sauce, macaroni, salad, raisin pie, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

The starch usually supplied by potatoes is found in the macaroni salad suggested in the dinner menu. Celery and lettuce and vitamins, making the dish an excellent potato substitute. The combination of spinach and mushrooms is well worth trying, as the rich flavor of the mushrooms adds much to the mildness of the spinach.

Cocconut Tapioca Pudding Three tablespoons minute tapioca, 2 tablespoons cornmeal, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 1/2 cups milk, 3/4 cup brown sugar. Heat milk in double boiler. Mix tapioca, cornmeal, coconut, sugar and salt and stir into hot milk. Cook until mixture thickens. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake three-quarters of an hour in a moderate oven. Chill and serve with cream.

Power Line Work Progresses. ALBANY, Ore.—Reconstruction of the power lines from Albany south to Springfield and west to Corvallis is nearly completed. The work has been in progress since last summer and a large crew has been kept at work during the winter. This work was done by the Mountain States Power company, which maintains headquarters for Oregon in Albany.
