University Staunch Aid To Northwest Industry

SEATTLE, (AP)—Economic development of the Northwest, husky young commonwealth constituting one of the corners of the Union, has received staunch aid from the University of Washington.

The college of fisheries developed a process of canning crabs that added, the first year, \$450,000 to the resources of Washington and Alaska. It now is devising a method to can smelt and is giving studied assistance to the cod fishing industry in the North Pacific, where there are 50,000 square miles of cod banks, engaging thirty-six vessels.

The college of forestry originated a kiln for drying Douglas fir in thirty-three percent the time formerly required. A large lumber firm estimated the saving in the last five years at more than \$250,000.

The college of mines is devising methods of using sponge iron for the manufacture of foundry iron and steel and a way has been found for converting scrap iron into marketable steel cheaply, quickly and efficiently.

In the department of ceramics, means of making roof and floor tile from Washington clays have been evolved so that now almost half the tile used in the state is produced within its boundaries.

Prof. Hewitt Wilson with a view of utilizing a vast deposit of kiesel in Eastern Washington invented a compound to produce cheaper china of a grade supposedly obtainable only in England and Germany.

Dynalite, an explosive made from sawdust and pronounced as effective as dynamite was discovered by Dr. William Dean at the college. It can be produced at approximately a fourth of the cost of dynamite.

basketball team by a score of 20 to 21 here last night. With five minutes to go Whitman had 19 to 18 lead. Whitman led 12 to 10 at half time. The score was tied five times during the game.

LEWIS DOWNS EUSTACE DENVER (By the Associated Press)—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, claimant to the world's heavyweight championship, defeated Alton Eustace of Kansas here last night. Lewis won the first fall in 59 minutes and 11 seconds with a headlock. Eustace was unable to continue and forfeited the match.

Billy Evans Says:

The remarkable success of Puerto Nurni, Finland's great runner, certainly excited an interest in this country by crack foreign athletes.

During the winter Hooton of Germany, Paulsen of Holland, Goodwin of England and Hoff of Norway have shown their wares to eastern audiences. All were proclaimed second Nurnis by their press agents but Hoff alone has lived up to advance notice. He alone compares with the great Finn.

Apparently Hoff appreciates the value of being a good actor as well as the graces of all pace vaulters. It is said Hoff can do 14 feet, considered an impossible height. The other vaulting is doing his

stuff he failed to clear the bar at 12 feet 2 inches and suffered a heavy fall as a result.

After being assisted to his feet and helped to a chair, he rested a few minutes, took a drink of water, then proceeded to clear the bar at 12 feet 2 inches with ease.

The audience greeted his effort with cheers. Hoff has proved his gameness by breaking a record after suffering what seemed a serious injury.

No doubt some one has him tipped off that American audiences are here worshippers that they crave record breaking performances.

In his first four appearances in this country, Hoff has sent the fans away satisfied by breaking 4 former records. He started by doing 12 feet 1 inch and has bettered each leap by one and one-half inches or less.

Being a good showman, Hoff is carrying the fans along. Instead of showing all his stuff at once, he is

simply breaking some previous mark by a slight margin.

In this way he maintains interest in each appearance and at the same time arouses much curiosity as to what he can really do. Several track coaches of prominent eastern colleges have already expressed the opinion that he will better 14 feet, regarded as an impossible height for any pole vaulter, or even attempt.

Hoff is the only foreign athlete to rate with Nurnis and he should be far more popular since he has a pleasing personality, something Nurnis sadly lacked.

The tour of the United States by Hoff has made possible what should prove to be one of the most interesting athletic events ever staged.

It will be a meeting between Charley Hoff and Harold Gouzen, Hoff is considered to be the greatest all-round athlete in Europe, many consider Hoff to be the world's greatest pole vaulter.

Gouzen's specialty is the high jump. Hoff the pole-vaulter, but both shine in practically every other track event.
