 The following data is for the last month of last semester which ended January 27. There were 292 boys, 250 girls; the total of which was 542. Percent of attendance was 95.7. There were 91 boys absent or tardy and 136 girls. Total—227. Tardies for January were 26 for the boys and 43 for the girls. Total amounted to 69. During the month ending February 13, the enrollment had reached 592 boys, 274 girls, making a total of 866. Those neither absent nor tardy numbered—170 boys, 143 girls, making a total of 313. The total number of tardies was 23 boys, 27 girls, making a total of 50. Percent of attendance 96.5.

Ore Treatment Process

A Monument to Women
 DENVER (AP)—From a woman's interest for dirt has developed the oil selective flotation process which has made the treatment of complex and low grade ores a success. Millions of dollars have been made and saved by the method, although its originator, Carrie Everson, has passed into practical obscurity.

J. J. Clark, majority owner in the big Kittimat mine at Silverton, Colo., tells how she stumbled onto the idea, and other Denver mining men vouch for his story. "One day in 1897," Clark says, "Miss Everson was in her brother's assay office in Denver and saw a pile of dirty ore sacks, which her woman's instinct for cleanliness impelled her to tackle. She dumped them in a pail of sudsy water and washed them around until a scum appeared on the surface of the water—a scum, which, to her eyes, appeared to contain mineral values, although at the time she could not conceive of metals floating.

"She removed the scum, poured out the sudsy water and found at the bottom of the pail a sludge which she knew to be only waste rock particles. The mineral values had floated to the top while the rock sunk.

"The brother analyzed the scum and determined that lead and zinc values had ridden to the surface on the grease bubbles of the soap, just as in the modern flotation process they rise to the surface on tiny rafts of oil.

"The brother took up the idea and started to develop it in a small way; trying to interest many prominent mining men. In a short while many scientific investigators were at work on the same thing, but it was several years before the oil flotation method became any more than a secondary method for separating ore.

"The idea never died out, however, and ten years ago metallurgists in Australia made a great step by floating silver, lead and zinc separately in different oils. The work halted perfection of the process and it was not until 1920 that both Australian and American metallurgists made real progress and developed the method in a practical position. Now it is used almost throughout the world and has made paying projects out of workings hitherto unprofitable."
