Bible Movies To Illustrate 2 Addresses

Pastors Will Draft Screen To Help Expound Their Sermon Themes Sunday Evening.

Bible scenes will enfold themselves upon the screen for the congregations of two La Grande churches Sunday evening. At the First Presbyterian, the first of a series of film pictures on "The Life and Travels of Jesus," forming a feature of the Lenten observance, will be shown. At the First Baptist, the Rev. George Albert Pollard will illustrate his sermon with pictures that show the relations of King Saul and David. The monthly musical program will be given by the choir of St. Peter's church at 7:30 a. m. In the morning at 10:30 a. m., Pastor J. C. Y. Dunn, pastor, will present a future work program for the congregation and action of the members.

First Presbyterian. Both sermons by the Rev. W. C. Rose will take recognition of the season of Lent. In the morning he will preach the second in a series on "The Character of Jesus." J. L. Lindsay will play a violin solo, and Mrs. J. A. Tedford will furnish music on the pipe organ. The service will follow Sunday school, which begins at 9:45 a. m. Junior and Intermediate Christian Endeavorers will meet at the usual hours.

PLATOON SYSTEM PROVING TO BE A GREAT SUCCESS

PORTLAND, Ore.—The platoon system of study has become by far more popular in the Portland schools than was expected by its proponents when it was installed. The system was tried out in one of the schools about two years ago for the first time, and is now used in 15. The pupils not only think it is wonderful but the teachers and the parents are also enthusiastic in praise of its advantages.

Beginning with the present term a number of schools were started in the platoon and up to date 30 per cent of the enrollment of grammar school pupils are under the system. If the plans of the school board work out and if the work in the schools improves in the manner anticipated, it will not be long until the whole city school enrollment will be under the platoon system.

The name platoon is applied because the school is divided up into two sections which are not unlike platoons. While one of these platoons, which is called the "home room section," is working in its room, the other is working in the classes of "special activities." The work under the "home room" classes is composed of reading, writing, arithmetic, spelling and sometimes history, while that under the "special activities" is composed of music, art, auditorium work, gymnasium, manual training, domestic science, and other minor branches. The sections spend half of the morning in each of the branches. In the afternoon there is another complete switch of classes.

One advantage of the platoon system that has been observed by the school board is that the teachers have a chance to teach the subjects they are best qualified to and don't have to teach every subject in the curriculum. Another advantage is that all of the rooms in the school are in use at one time. Thus increasing the capacity of the school building. The old method required that the pupils be in one room at the same time to hold a certain class, but now the pupils are so divided that all of the rooms are in use by different classes.
