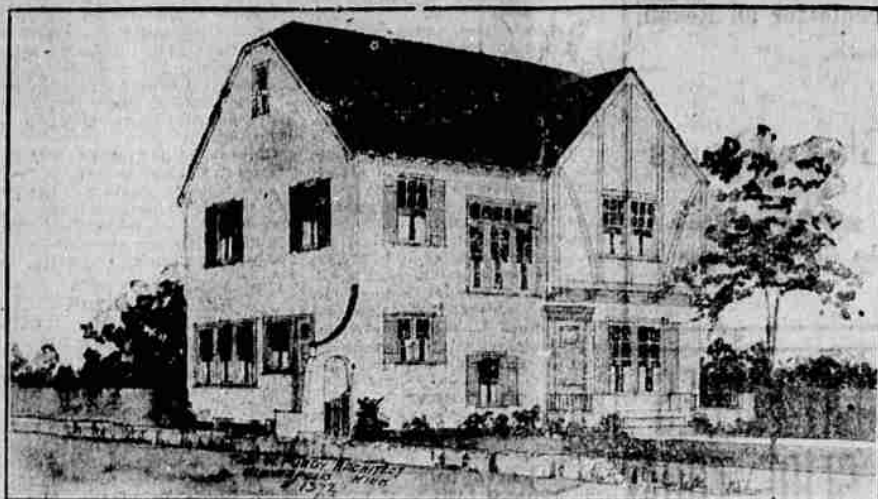
He then staked the limit on number six and all multiples of six and won steadily.

An English Type Home

It is difficult to get a more picturesque type of home than the English, with its regular walls broken by many different sizes of window openings, the half timber work in the gables, the variegated shingle roof, "English Tan Colored Stucco" over metal lath, brick soldier course, terraced in front with iron railing, this home will appeal to anyone contemplating building.

The outside woodwork is painted a green, to match up with the straw and green colored shingles (the predominant shade of the roof).

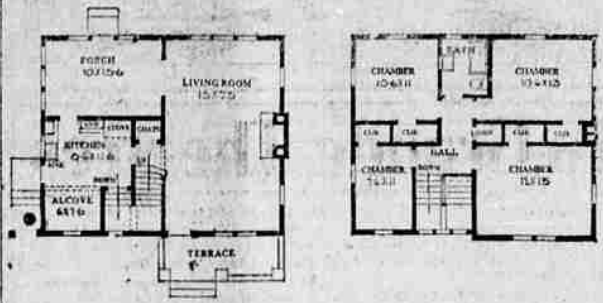
On entering this home, we find the interior just as fascinating as the exterior; from the terrace one enters directly into the large living room, along the side, with its massive fireplace carried up to the ceiling. A pair of French doors open into a glazed-in porch or sun room, which is used as a dining room for the evening meal.

The stairway, placed in the front, convenient to the kitchen, is very effective with its hand rail and balusters. The kitchen and breakfast room are ideal. Note the convenience of the large coat closet.

On the second floor is to be found three fine chambers and one smaller one, each with ample closet room.

There is a full basement with the usual furnace room, laundry, storage and fruit. Finished with oak floors, oak trim for the first floor, stained an antique, kitchen in white enamel; the entire second floor in ivory with walnut doors, bath floor and wainscot in tile, it is estimated that this home can be built for \$7500 to \$9000, exclusive of heating and plumbing.
