The dynamic presence of Pola Negri is once again in our midst, this time in a picture at the Star, entitled "A Woman of the World." From a strictly story standpoint, this vehicle is easily the best Pola has had to date, for aside from the modernness of his plot and American locale, it presents her in an appealing sympathetic role that offers full scope for her emotional brand of acting, and at the same time permits her to essay a little comedy now and then.
The action begins in Europe and we learn that Pola is the Countess Natalina, who has tattooed her arm as a symbol of her love for her fiancée. When he proves unfaithful, she decides to go to America and visit some distant relatives in Maple Valley, Iowa. To say that she creates a sensation when she suddenly descends upon this typically Main Street community is putting it mildly.
Imagine a peace-keeper in a chicken coop and you'll understand why Pola with her magnificent Parisian manners rouses the townspeople to a frenzy of excitement.
Malcolm St. Clair deserves an important share of the credit for his expert direction and the general technical excellence of the film. Pierre Collings, who wrote the screen adaptation from the novel by Carl Van Vechten, is another who comes in for honorable mention.

IRON DYKE MINE SOLD
BAKER, Ore.—The Iron Dyke mine at Hornstedt, believed to be worth about \$5,000,000 was reported today to have been sold. After several weeks of negotiations in New York, a telegram was received by P. H. Miller of Weiser from Dr. Walter Harvey Wood to the effect that the transaction has been completed. The Idaho Copper corporation, of which Dr. Wood, said to be one of the foremost mining experts in America, is the operating head, is now the owner of the property. Wood's telegram instructs Miller to take over the property at once, to sign a new contract for power and to put the mine in shape for immediate production. Dr. Wood also said in his message that negotiations for the purchase of the Red Lodge were progressing.
