La Salle Street Wolf Passes in Penitentiary
 ATLANTA, Ga. Mar. 2. (AP)—John Whitehouse, Worthington, of Chicago known as the "Wolf of LaSalle street" died at the Atlanta Federal prison today where he was serving a term for using the mails to defraud.

Death was caused by a stroke of paralysis. Worthington was brought to the penitentiary on last October 10 to serve two years. He was suffering from diabetes and a former paralytic stroke and had to be carried into the penitentiary.

During the six months' confinement he was kept in the prison hospital and given special treatment for diabetes. His condition was thought to be improving but the second stroke of paralysis this morning proved fatal.
