Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast—Grapefruit, toasted whole wheat biscuit with hot milk, liver and bacon, reheated potatoes, corn bread, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Cream of pea soup, scroutons, cottage cheese salad, whole wheat bread, ring of apples, milk, tea.

Dinner—Swiss steak with brown gravy, mashed potatoes, creamed onions, cabbage salad, raspberry trifle, crisp cookies, bran bread, milk, coffee.

If canned fruit is drained from its juice and the juice made into jelly by the use of gelatine and then the fruit and the stiffening jelly are combined and allowed to chill and become firm, the addition of a garniture of whipped cream and the sherbet or parfait glasses makes a tempting "trifle."

Eight medium-sized tart apples, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup boiling water, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 tablespoon granulated gelatine, 4 tablespoons cold water, 1 cup currant jelly, 1/2 cup shredded almonds, 1 cup whipping cream, 4 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Combine water and sugar and bring to the boiling point. Pare and core apples and cut in thin slices. When the water and sugar are boiled to the crack stage add apples and cook to a thick marmalade.

Add cinnamon. Soften gelatine in cold water for ten minutes. Stir in apples and remove from fire. Pour into a ring mold first dipped in cold water. Let stand until chilled and firm. Unmold onto a large serving plate. Whip cream until cold, adding powdered sugar and vanilla when almost whipped. Fill center of mold with whipped cream and pour over jelly melted over hot water. Spread almonds on a shallow pan and brown in a hot oven. Sprinkle nuts over mold and serve. The nuts of course are prepared while the apples are cooking and are thoroughly cooled when needed.

The "crack stage" of sirup is reached when a little dropped into cold water hardens at once and the threads formed in the water break with a snap between the fingers.

This is an excellent dessert for the women on a farm to keep in mind.

OFFICIALS SPEED UP DRAFTING OF TAXPAYERS GUIDE

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3. (AP)—With the time within which the public must file its tax returns expiring the treasury departments reports are speeding up the drafting of regulations to guide taxpayers. As the first step the new revenue law is declared effective as of 10:25 A. M. February 26.

When President Coolidge signed the measure, the changed inheritance tax rates also are effective as of that hour as are many other repeated or modified taxes while the income tax provisions are applicable to incomes of last year on which payments will be made this year.

Reduction of the automobile passenger tax from five to three percent will be come effective at midnight March 25, along with the increased exemptions on admissions, which hereafter will include tickets of 75 cents and less. On that date also repeal of the stamp taxes on deeds of conveyances and custom warehouse entries and withdrawals will go into effect.

Repeal of the taxes on capital stock, tobacco manufacturers, brokers, bowling alleys, billiard rooms, shooting galleries, riding academies and automobiles for hire will become effective June 30.

A 10 by 10 plot will give a succession of young onions for those who like this succulent vegetable, starting with sets in the early spring and following with seed onions later. Sweet chard on a small patch will keep the family in greens for the greater part of the summer, a most useful vegetable for a small space and a constant yielder if the leaves are cut off instead of pulling up the entire crop. It produces over a long season. A garden of seasoning herbs may be planted on a ten-foot square sufficient to stock the pantry for the winter and furnish tasty ingredients for summer cooking. Among these are the savories, basil, marjoram, sage, parsley, chervil and thyme. Pole beans will give the biggest crop for the ground space of any the vegetables and the poles can be set closer on the small plot than on larger spaces.
