Southern Tyrol Again In Excited Condition

VIENNA, Mar. 3. (AP)—Fresh troubles in Southern Tyrol, the former Austrian territory which was given to Italy after the World war, are reported from Bozen (Bolzano) by the Neue Freie Presse.
 The dispatch said the Italian prefect of Trent dismissed 40 German physicians from the German district sick benefit association, substituting five Fascist doctors and applied the association's funds to party interests. A German medical journal was suppressed and 160 German physicians were compelled to join the Fascist syndicate.
