CHICAGO, Mar. 7. (AP)—(U. S. Department of Agriculture)—Hog receipts 15,000; moderately active; mostly steady to strong; spots 10 cents higher; bulk 240 to 325 pound butchers \$11.90 to \$12.50; top on 120 pounds up \$12.70.

Cattle receipts 6,000; snappy trade on most classes; better grade fed steers fully 25 cents higher on shippers' account; spots lower; \$12.25 paid for heavy and medium weights; numerous loads with weight \$10.75 to \$11.50; bulk \$9.50 to \$10.50; fat cows and heifers showing steady advance; vealers 50 cents higher; mostly \$12 to \$13 to packers; outsiders upward to \$15.50 and better.

Sheep receipts 18,000; fat lambs slow; practically no early sales; choice heavy weights held above \$14.75; indications generally 25 cents lower; spots off more on heavies; nothing done on feeding lambs; talking around steady; very few fat sheep offered; odd lots fat ewes \$5 to \$8.50 steady.

STOCK FALL GREAT.
WALL STREET, New York. (By the Associated Press)—Stupendous liquidation of the so-called railroad merger shares finally engulfed today's stock market and carried prices down 1 to 25 points in an unprecedented volume of trading. The maximum break took place in Nickel Plate common stock, which dropped from last night's close of 142 to 125. American Can collapsed 16 1/2 points to 297 1/2, and extreme declines of 6 to nearly 15 points took place in General Electric, Pittsburgh and West Virginia, Erie common, Atlantic Coast Line, Louisville and Nashville, Ward Baking and Foundation company. The closing was weak. Total sales approximated 3,500,000 shares.

CLAIM STAGGERING

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 7. (AP)—The state board of control was staggered today upon presentation of a claim for \$298.69 damages from Mrs. W. L. Moore, whose home two miles south of Tamm was inaugurated February 4 by three girls who escaped from the state industrial school. Among the items described in the claim was a diamond stud upon which Mrs. Moore places a value of \$500.

BUTTER AND EGGS MAINTAINING A STEADIER TONE

PORTLAND, Mar. 7. (AP)—Butter and eggs are maintaining a steady tone now with production well balanced with current requirements. With the exception of a half cent decline in current receipts eggs board quotations are unchanged.

During February butter receipts showed a further decline in this market dropping lower than either December or January and showing but little larger than October and November.

Portland milk shows a slight increase over January. The combined receipts and churning total 661,683 pounds about the average since last October.

Egg Situation Critical.
The egg situation is still critical for holders of storage stocks. Holdings worked down to around 500 cases at one time during the month but some storage movement since then have brought the cooler holdings up to 812 cases. There were 516 cases in storage the first of February.

Receipts for the month practically equalled January which totalled 21,884 cases.

Country dressed meats are showing an easier trend along the street today. Choice light veal is lower at 16 to 17 cents. Hogs still holding at 18 to 19 1/2 cents, but receipts are larger.

Poultry continues firm with prices well maintained. Brisk demand absorbs daily arrivals. Heavy hens are held at 25 to 26 cents and light hens 20 to 21 cents.
