LONDON. (AP)—Women clerks and typists are on the increase in the United Kingdom, there being nearly as many employed as men. Estimates of the National Federation of Professional Workers show there are approximately 500,000 women so employed.

Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary) Breakfast—Grape-fruit, cereal, thin cream, fish and rice on toast, crisp Graham toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Tomato rabbit on toast, butter radishes, dried apple pudding, milk tea.

Dinner—Broiled porterhouse steak, mashed potatoes, parsnip patty cakes, kumquat salad, whole wheat bread, queen of puddings, milk, coffee.

The fish and rice dish suggested in the breakfast menu is planned for school children and is supposed to be the "left-over" from the immediately preceding dinner.

Tomato Rabbit on Toast Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 4 tablespoons cream, 1/2 cup strained tomato juice, 1-1/2 teaspoon soda, 2 cups grated cheese, 3 eggs.

Melt butter, stir in flour and when perfectly blended stir in cream. Dissolve soda in tomato and slowly add to first mixture, stirring constantly. Add cheese and cook over a low fire, stirring constantly until melted. Add eggs slightly beaten and cook over hot water until mixture coats the spoon. Season with salt and pepper and serve on triangles of hot toast.

The Garden

GARDENING A CONTINUOUS PERFORMANCE

The ideal vegetable garden is a mass of growing things from early spring to killing frosts. This is accomplished only by a thought-out and well-studied system of follow and companion planting so that the gardener is ready with another crop to go in when one comes out. This is a development of modern gardening which is restricted to smaller spaces than it was a generation ago when enough space was readily available to plant every vegetable on its own individual space and turnips to follow peas constituted the chief attempt at follow cropping.

Now when the radishes are past their prime they are removed for beans, carrots, or some other later crop. Formerly they were allowed to run to seed. The lettuce patch will support a late planting of peas, beans, corn, beets or carrots. Among the most vines to plant are the new vine tomatoes and started on their stakes to occupy the entire space when the pea vines are pulled up after yielding their crops.

A seed bed adjoining the garden is the chief convenience and mainstay to keep the garden continuously at work, transplanting from the seed bed crops of late-yielding vegetables to the places occupied by the earlier ones. Here peppers, egg plants and tomatoes may be nursed along until the settled weather arrives, when it is time to put them into the garden where some of the earlier crops are on the wane.

Cabbage, cauliflower, brussels sprouts and celery all can be started in the seed bed and be ready to move into the garden as

soon as any vacancies occur. Make the garden a continuous performance and leave no ground idle if you would make the most of it.

A few trials will make the follow and companion crop idea a matter of habit, keeping in mind that the cabbage tribe and the bean tribe should not succeed each other or occupy the same space succeeding years for best results.

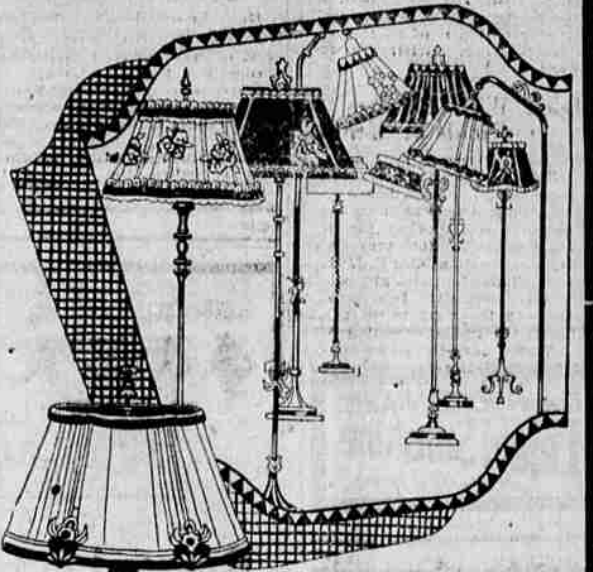
