The signatures of school board members procured from them individually do not make a contract enforceable on the board as a whole, the superintendent stated, since the state law provides that "all decisions, whether by contract or otherwise, must be approved by the district school board when in session, before an order can be drawn on the district clerk for the same, and no officer can draw an order on the treasurer unless he is authorized to do so by a vote of the board at a regular or special meeting."
"So, instead of listening to some agent telling you what your school needs, just visit your school," the superintendent writes to his board of directors, "and with the help of your teacher consult the course of study for Oregon schools. You can soon determine your real needs. If you want prices or information concerning books, contact your county or state library."

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 5. (AP).—Mrs. Louis Palmer Weber has announced her candidacy for the Democratic nomination for governor.

In 1918 she was champion of Governor Pierce, whom she will now oppose for the nomination. Among other reasons given by her for desiring the Pierce standard is the governor's management of the penitentiary and appointments to office.

Hahn was captured in Los Angeles when he ran away from here two months ago; after failing to live up to a court order that he should pay \$25 monthly to his dependents.

The federal bureau should have control of border patrols, he said, as well as the issuing of permits for withdrawals in order to prevent "leakage."

WEST WANTS MORE OFFICERS
SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 5. (AP).—A recommendation to Washington officials requesting a greater number of men for enforcement of the prohibition law on land and an increase in the coast guard fleet, was made today by Pacific coast federal prohibition directors in a special conference which was called by Colonel Ned M. Green, prohibition administrator of Northern California, on orders from the federal prohibition department in Washington.
The recommendation said that such increases in the land and sea forces are "absolutely essential" in carrying on prohibition work here.

TO MAKE SADDLE TREES
PENDLETON, Ore., Mar. 5. (AP).—The Pendleton Saddle Tree company will soon start operations here with the arrival of necessary machinery. This is the second factory of its kind in the state and the sixth in the United States. Maple, pine and fir are to be used in the manufacture of the saddle trees.

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ed the initial weight, the final weight, the daily gain and the average gain, also what rations had been fed. Alfalfa, silage, molasses and different grains, such as rye, oats, barley, wheat, corn and peas, were the feeds used. Some of the alfalfa used was long, some cut and some ground into meal.

A complete report of the tests will not be possible until the sheep are sold, showing the returns from the feeding tests as compared with the cost of the feed. The highest gains were made by lot No. 11. The sheep in this lot were fed on meal, molasses and barley.

H. K. Dean, superintendent of the Hermiton experiment station was present and stated that for the sheep tested there in the years 1923, 1924 and 1925 they had received enough to enable them to pay \$15 a ton for hay, a price higher than hay was in Grande Ronde valley during that year and also considerably higher than hay at Hermiton at that time. Similar results have been secured at the Union station.

As there is a surplus of hay this year farmers are interested in a way of feeding it.
