## YOUR INCOME TAX

If you are single and support in your home one or more persons closely related to you and over whom you exercise family control, you are the head of a family and entitled under the revenue act of 1926 to the same personal exemption allowed a married person, \$3,500. In addition, a taxpayer is entitled to a credit of \$400 for each person dependent upon him for chief support, if such person is either under 18 years of age or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective. Such dependent need not be a

relative.

For example, an unmarried son who supports in his home an aged mother is entitled to an exemption of \$3,500, plus the \$400 credit for a dependent, a total of \$3,900. If from choice the mother lived in another city, the son, although her chief support, would be entitled only to the \$1,500 exemption, plus the \$400 credit. The mother not living with him, he is not considered the head of a family.

An exemption as the head of a family can be claimed by only one member of a household.

The \$400 credit does not apply to the wife or husband of a taxpayer, though one may be totally dependent upon the other.

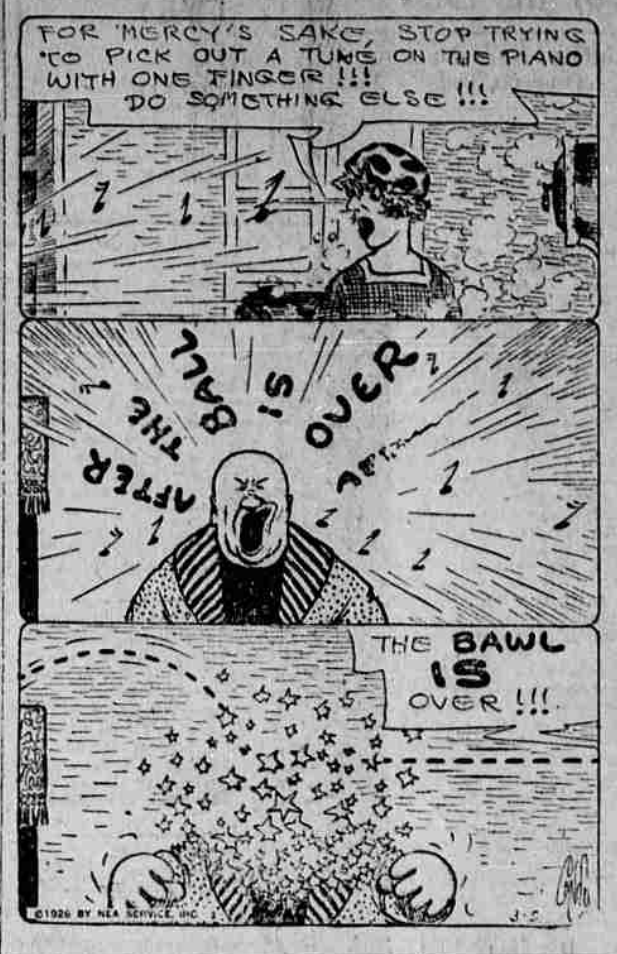
