**WOOL INDIFFERENT.**  
BOSTON, Mass., Mar. 5. (AP)—  
The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow  
will say: "The market for wool con-  
tinues to be very indifferent. Manu-  
facturers are buying sparingly  
and constantly the pressure is  
for lower prices, although some of  
the larger mills are understood to  
have some very decent orders for  
wovens. Woolens are out of favor  
for the most part this season. The  
season is young, however, and a  
better demand all around may be  
expected in the near future."

The foreign markets are gen-  
erally strong and especially so on  
fine wools, although the European  
trade is now depressed to await the  
opening of the second colonial ses-  
sion of auctions in London Tues-  
day. Prices there are expected by  
Yorkshire to be on the basis pre-  
valing at the January series close.  
Growers some of whom have  
been angling for bids on their new  
clip have been rather disappoint-  
ed and disturbed over the lack of  
interest of the eastern dealers,  
who are refraining from contract-  
ing very steadily. But Arizona are  
being sold now and again at about  
\$1.00 a bushel, but steady.

The rail and water shipments of  
wool from Boston from January 1,  
1925 to March 4, 1926, inclusive  
were 44,677,000 pounds against 33,  
612,000 pounds for the same pe-  
riod last year. The receipts from  
January 1, 1925 to March 4, 1926,  
inclusive, were 71,371,000 pounds  
against 68,119,000 pounds for the  
same period last year.

**BROCCOLI VEGETABLES DOWN.**  
PORTLAND, Mar. 5. (AP)—  
Thirty-six cars of broccoli were  
moved out of the Umpqua valley,  
the heaviest loading for any one  
day during the season. The early  
strains have now been practically  
exhausted and cutting is now start-  
ing on the later strains. Prices  
have declined slightly, are not move-  
ments being slow at \$1.15 to \$1.25  
for No. 1 crates. The demand is  
heavy, but buyers are quoting  
prices of 30 cents to \$1 per crate,  
while shippers are holding out for  
higher prices. Weather conditions  
remain ideal for maturity and har-  
vest.

## Butter, Eggs Marking Time on Today's Mart

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 5. (AP)—  
Butter and eggs are marking time  
in the local dairy market. Prices  
for the day are unchanged with the  
movement generally at steady  
prices.

Receipts are fairly plentiful in  
both lines but a good shipping out-  
let takes care of supplies over and  
above the market's requirements.  
Fine weather is largely responsible  
for the increased production.

Cube butter receipts yesterday  
were reported at 3555 pounds with  
13,382 pounds manufactured. Storage  
holdings were reported at 16,  
987 pounds.

Fresh eggs receipts yesterday in  
the local market amounted to 1320  
cases. This does not include dealers  
outside of the exchange who make  
no report.

Country dressed meats are about  
steady. Veal receipts are increas-  
ing and 17 cents is the top on choice  
light calves. Hogs at 18 to 18 1/2c.

**FOREIGN TRADE, WASHINGTON, Mar. 5. (AP)—**  
Revised figures on the foreign trade  
of the United States for January  
made public today by the com-  
merce department, showed the un-  
favorable trade balance against  
America for the month was \$19,  
576,339. Preliminary figures had  
placed it at approximately \$15,  
000,000.

The imports for the month were  
valued at \$416,766,413 and exports  
were \$397,195,523. Europe held  
first place in the trade, sending  
here goods valued at \$111,216,059  
and taking American goods to the  
amount of \$199,794,209.

These figures showed exports to  
Europe had fallen off approxi-  
mately \$70,000,000 as compared  
with a year ago while imports from  
Europe had increased more than  
\$8,000,000.

The trade with the United King-  
dom, usually America's largest  
customer, showed exports of \$24,  
158,884 against imports of \$24,  
620,332. These figures compared  
with exports of \$113,136,945 and  
imports of \$25,177,932 a year ago.
