Sunny, spring weather inevitably brings the baseball bee out of his hibernating period and sends him buzzing around the fan's bonnet.

Today Charles Reynolds, official of La Grande's championship entry into the Blue Mountain league last year, announced that all interested in the national game will meet at the city hall next Tuesday night at 7:30 o'clock for the purpose of reorganizing the league for 1926.

On March 21 representatives of Oregon and Washington towns will meet at Pendleton to reorganize the Blue Mountain league, select officers, and probably draw up a season's schedule.

Hoff Says Pole Vault Limit 14 Feet 6 Inches

NEW YORK, Mar. 5. (By the Associated Press)—What is the ultimate in pole vaulting—the "roof" in this specialty?

This question has arisen frequently in the minds of track fans as they have watched world records topple under the attack of Charley Hoff, Norwegian "Vaulting Viking."

From his acquaintance with dizzy heights, Hoff may be the best qualified to supply the answer and he gives it unhesitatingly by placing the "limit" at 14 feet 6 inches.

This mark is slightly more than a half-foot beyond the present world's outdoor mark, set by Hoff at 13 feet 11 13/16 inches. The Norwegian is not at all confident of his own ability, however, to reach what he considers the "peak" in vaulting. He simply contends that it may be done "some day by somebody," though the average critic can figure no performer other than Hoff with much chance of going to such unprecedented heights.

"Why do I set 14-6 as the limit?" Hoff repeated. "Because I am convinced that beyond that mark it would be impossible to gain the speed and keep the grip necessary to clear the bar. The vaulter would be unable to 'carry through' and so would fall backward."
