The finals between the winner of McLaughlin, Marshfield, Medford, Eugene and The Dalles, against the winner of Baker, Astoria, Seaside and Hillsboro will be held Saturday night at 8:30 o'clock. Winners in the finals will be awarded first place in the tournament, and runner-up in the game will be placed second.

GOOD GROWTH WINTER WHEAT

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—The weather conditions remain very favorable with warm sunshine during the day.
