Sister Mary Says:

(By Sister Mary)

Breakfast—Stewed prunes, cereal thin cream, waffles, syrup, milk, coffee, crisp whole wheat toast.

Lunch—Sweet potato and nut puff, steamed spinach, graham bread, milk, tea.

Dinner—Shredded ham, baked with potatoes, stewed tomatoes, head lettuce with thousand island dressing, bean soup, rhubarb tapioca, pudding, milk, coffee.

Children under school age should be served a poached egg with their spinach for luncheon and not be allowed to partake of the sweet potato dish. The potato and nut puff is so well worth while for a family of adults, however, that the rule follows.

Sweet Potato and Nut Puff

One cup dry bread crumbs, 1 1/2 cups chicken nut meats, 3 cups mashed sweet potatoes, 2 eggs, 4 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 4 tablespoons cream.

Mix two tablespoons bread crumbs and four tablespoons nuts and remove for top of dish. Combine mashed potatoes, remaining bread crumbs and nuts, butter, salt and pepper and beat well. Add yolks of eggs until stiff and fold into whites in a well-beaten baking dish, cover with reserved crumbs and bake 30 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Serve as soon as the dish is well puffed and firm to the touch.

This combination dish is rich in protein and fat and makes an excellent meat substitute.

Game Commission Faces Shortage of \$22,000.00

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 9. (AP)—The state game commission faces a seasonal shortage of about \$22,000 on April 1, according to statements made at the regular March meeting of the body. Funds are usually lower at this time of year than any other, but it has been several years since the shortage was as great, chairman Harold Clifford said. On May 1, fees from fishing licenses will begin to come in and shortly after that the commission will be on a sound footing again, members said.

The Garden

PLANT VEGETABLES TO PLAN

Efficient vegetable growing demands planning in advance for best results and putting the plan on paper, no matter how roughly, as a guide when it comes to put the seeds and plants into the soil. Store the plan after planting for reference next year to arrange for a rotation of crops, use cabbage and turnips should not grow in the same place succeeding years and neither should peas and beans. It is best to make the plan to scale on strong paper which can be tacked on the side of the barn or garage or on a convenient fence post for reference when operations on the ground begin. By laying out the amount of

space to be planted, assigning the length of rows to be given to each vegetable, it is an easy matter to select the amount of seed necessary for the garden, often a hit-and-miss job, and the gardener finds himself confronted with a collection of seed packets and wonders just where he will put them. Study the exposure of the plot set aside for vegetables in regard to sun and shade. Plant the tall growing vegetables such as corn where they will not shade lower growing plants or, if it is necessary that they give some shade, place the rows so that it will be for the least practicable portion of the day.

The first practical move towards making a better garden is to space accurately between the rows to permit of easy cultivation with a wheel hoe or with hand tools. Too narrow rows soon become overrun with weeds and an effort to hoe them out clips the vegetables on either side. It is better to waste space in the ground between rows than to have it too narrow. Plants in crowded rows do not have sufficient room for their best development.

The seed packets contain accurate directions as to distances that may be followed to advantage.

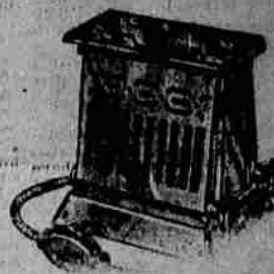
and Helmer Neechym, 18. Attempts to dispose of turkish rug furnished the clue. Police broke into a home where the loot had been boxed for shipment.
