Charge System Adopted
J. D. Field, agent of the American Railway Express company here, announced today that the express companies plan to establish a system of a charge for the storing of express shipments refused when tendered for delivery or uncollected. A docket outlining the proposal has been issued for the information of the public, and, in due course it will be filed with the interstate commerce commission as an addition to the express classification to become effective on or about May 1. Three days "free time" will be allowed after which the storage charge will be 10 cents for the first day, five cents for each of the next eight days with a maximum of 50 cents a month for each shipment weighing 100 pounds or less.

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 9. (AP)—Norman Davis, held in the Lane county jail for the alleged theft of an automobile, is today confined to a darkened cell as punishment for an attempted jail break yesterday. Davis worked a hole through the jail wall, near a window, but was unable to enlarge the hole to allow him to pass through, and he gave up the job.

Officers, who discovered that the jail wall was being worked upon from the inside were waiting just outside to see which of the prisoners was involved in the attempted break, but no prisoners came through.

When the bricks had ceased falling upon the jail lawn, and all signs of activities had ceased, officers lined the prisoners up, and picked out Davis as the one who had been doing the work. His fingers were worn and his clothing showed signs of brick dust and dry mortar.

"The Experience of a Potato Grower" on the program, devoted to the cultivation of the tuber.

H. H. Weatherstone, of Elgin, a man whose name is widely associated with the beautiful orchards of his community, will address the horticulturists on "The Apple Situation in Union County."

Berry Culture
That berries—raspberries, strawberries, loganberries, can be cultivated in the Grande Ronde valley extensively and with profit is the opinion of J. S. Mills, president of the Cove Commercial club, who will speak on "The Possibilities of Berry Growing."

John Deane, one of the valley's biggest prime shippers, will tell the conference audience "How to Make Prunes Pay." Mr. Deane, whose home is at Cove, distributed great quantities of fancy boxed prunes last fall.

"Cherry Marketing" will be the subject of T. C. Harty's department. Mr. Harty is secretary of the Cove Cherry Growers' association.

Dairy Division
The dairy division will be in charge of Robert Whycombe, who as director of the East Oregon Experiment station at Union heads one of the largest institutions of that kind in the world, and one especially noted for its work with livestock. He will report the dairy demonstration work at the Union station.

Frank McKennon, of Imbler, assisted by E. A. Sisco, county superintendent of schools, and Mrs. J. E. Mills, a local leader at Cove, will have charge of the boys' and girls' club program. Mr. McKennon is the father of Russell McKennon, one of the pig club winners and a member of the county judging team.

"The Livestock Situation as Affecting Union County" is to be the subject of S. E. Miller's address. Mr. Miller is the owner of extensive holdings and lives at Union.

Irrigation
A. R. Hunter, of La Grande, who has been one of the leaders in the movement to discover whether irrigation is feasible in the Grande Ronde valley, will lead the discussion of irrigation. Mr. Hunter is Union county representative in the state legislature.

The home economics department, or homemakers' division, as the program lists it, comes under the direction of Mrs. S. E. Miller, of Union, a woman's club leader and a prominent worker in the interest of county affairs.

George Hall, who owns a large poultry farm in Fruitdale and is president of the Union County Co-operative Poultry association, will tell of the work being done by the organization that he represents.

Floyd Edwards, who is on the staff at the experiment station in Union, will speak on "Farm Poultry Results at the Union Station."

Child Welfare
Dr. E. P. Landis, medical member of the La Grande board of education, will be a conference speaker, having as his theme, "School Sanitation." Miss Alice H. Marquardt, county health nurse, will talk on "Child Welfare."

The Union county chamber of commerce president, Dr. W. T. Phy, of the Hot Lake sanatorium, also will be on the health program of the conference. He announces as his subject, "Health."

Carleton Speaks
Mr. Carleton, formerly a member of the Joseph, Ore., high school faculty, delivered the main address of the meeting, touching upon the boy problem of the state and nation. He paid a high compliment to the young people, saying that they are more ambitious, cleaner, and more wholesome today than ever before.

"No influence is so great in character formation as good books, with the sole exception of the mother's training," he declared, and described ways and means that parents might use to advantage in directing their children's energies into the right channels.

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dinavian bloc is forming against reconstruction of the league's administrative board.

The situation today is that five members of the council favor the creation of one or more additional seats namely, France, Spain, Italy, Czechoslovakia and Brazil. Sweden is openly hostile, while Great Britain, Japan, Belgium and Uruguay continue either reserved or open minded.

Great Britain apparently favors giving Spain a permanent chair, but is committed, her spokesman reiterated today, to do nothing which will make Germany's entrance to the league difficult or impossible.

Some friends of Spain openly fear that the Madrid delegates by their threats of withdrawal from the league their council ambitions are successful are forcing themselves into an embarrassing position.

Assembly in Haves
Three persons point out that with many governments backing her demand it would be illogical for Spain to dream of resigning from the league if, for example, the solitary vote of Sweden made her promotion to a permanent seat unobtainable for the moment.
