Attempt to Break Jail At Salem, Oregon Fails

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 10, (AP).—Paul Knorr, one of the trio being held in jail here charged with robbery of the Scotts Mills bank on December 24 of last year, made his second ineffectual attempt to escape from the county jail yesterday since being brought back from California with his companions a few weeks ago.

Knorr covered a steam pipe running to the ceiling with magazines to prevent burning himself, climbed the steam pipe, and had pulled two boards from the unsealed ceiling of the jail when the noise was heard by officers above who investigated. Knorr apparently heard the officers and fled back to his cell before they appeared on the scene. Toilet dust and dirt on Knorr's clothing and on his face and in his hair, however, revealed who had made the attempt.

OFFICERS SEEK CONVICT TRIO

ATLANTA, Ga., Mar. 10, (AP).—

Search today spread over five southern states for three Fulton county convicts, members of a party of six who late yesterday murdered, wounded their guards and an automobile they seized from two Atlanta society women.

One of the convicts, H. L. Davis, are in a hospital here with serious injuries with but little hope held out for their recovery.

The inquiry was staged when a party of eight convicts in charge of three guards were returning in a motor truck to a convict camp from the day's work. Three of the convicts, at a signal suddenly created a pistol from F. P. Bailey, a guard, and fired all the shots in that of Newsum, five of them taking effect.

Barfield and Guy Reid, another guard, brought their shotguns into play, wounding two of the prisoners. They pushed another from the truck. The wheels of the truck passed over him, causing his death, which ended his death.

All of the convicts except Travis and Raymond Sisson, serving four years for robbery, were recaptured.
