STOCK PRICES CLOSE STRONG

NEW YORK, Mar. 10. (By the Associated Press)—Stock prices bounded upward early this afternoon after a period of irregularity. The sudden outburst of strength followed the publication of the February tonnage report of the United States steel corporation showing a relatively small decrease in unfilled orders in view of the high rate of operations last month, and the raising of the Perre Marquette annual dividend from \$4 to \$6 with the declaration of a \$4 extra dividend of \$2.

The closing was strong. Signs of returning confidence continued to appear in the late trading, with short covering and occasional distributions of pool buying orders adding the advance.

BRIAND PICKS NEW CABINET

PARIS, Mar. 10. (AP)—Aristide Briand, for the ninth time premier of France, completed a reconstructed cabinet early today. Although disheartened over the defeat of his eighth cabinet last Saturday morning in the chamber of deputies on the government's financial bill, he was prevailed upon by President Doumergue as an act of patriotism again to take the helm.

The general opinion is that there is little difference between Briand's ninth cabinet and his eighth. The financial policy of the new cabinet is expected to follow closely that of the last one, but perhaps slightly different tactics.

"You see I am quick about it," remarked M. Briand at 2:30 a. m. as he left the Elysee palace, where President Doumergue has signed a decree reconstituting the ministry. "If the business had not been completed tonight it would not have been completed at all."

If possible M. Briand will return tonight to Geneva for the meeting of the league of nations. With M. Briand in away, the Geneva the other members of the cabinet will work on a few financial bills, for the situation brooks no delay. It is understood the new bill will contain the taxes already approved by both houses, leaving the disputed payments tax for inclusion in a second bill.

Powers File Protest On Blocking of Port

PERKING, Mar. 10. (AP)—Taking cognizance of the violation of the 1901 protocol requiring that communication be kept open, the powers today filed a protest with the Chinese foreign office against the blockade of Tien Tsin and demanded that the government bring about its immediate cessation by both hostile factions.

The powers reserve the right to collaborate for the protection of foreign shipping and provide for free access to the port of Tien Tsin should the government fail to take action forthwith to that end.

**Print Butter Drops
Two Cents in Portland**
PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 10. (AP)—Print butter is two cents lower in the local market today with 48 cents the creamery basis. Cartons are listed at 42 cents. On the dairy exchange cubes ranged fractionally lower with extras and standards each a half cent down at 42 1/2 and 42 1/2 cents, respectively. Lower grade cubes remained steady and unchanged.

In line with the decline in prints local creamery men also reduced their bids for butterfat. New prices range from 45 to 46 cents, f.o.b. shipper track and 48 cents delivered Portland on number 1 grade. Fresh eggs values also show a lower trend with extras and medium down a cent on the dairy exchange at 25 and 24 cents, respectively. Current receipts are a half cent lower at 22 1/2 cents. Live poultry and country dressed meats show little change for the day. Both lines generally steady with prices holding at former levels.

FEDERAL REPORT ISSUED
PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 10. (AP)—Eleven per cent of the wheat crop of Oregon, or 2,075,000 bushels estimated as being on the farms on March 1, in the government crop report issued today, does not represent all the wheat still owned by Oregon growers, said F. L. Kent, statistician of the department of agriculture, today.

"Possibly as much more wheat still in country elevators is owned by the growers, although delivered to the warehouses last fall," said Kent's statement. "Definite data on this point are not available, however."

Wheat in country mills and elevators throughout the U. S. on March 1, 1936, was estimated at 75,425,000 bushels or 11.3 per cent of the 1935 United States crop.

J. M. LYNCH FAVORED
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Mar. 10. (AP)—Relection of James M. Lynch of Syracuse, N. Y., as president of the International Typographical union by a larger majority than in 1924 is indicated in primary returns received at union headquarters. It was announced today.
